FOREWORD

Each step a child takes, lights our path. We walk together, shaping futures of hope.

This year, as I pause to reflect, I find myself returning again and again to the image of footprints. Some are small, hesitant. Some steady, full of resolve. Each one telling a story of growth, of pain overcome, of strength discovered. And of a future being quietly, bravely built.

The theme of this year's Annual Report-**Footsteps for My Future Path**-is not just poetic. It is deeply personal. It mirrors the journey of every child, every young person, and every family who have walked with us. It speaks to the early stumbles, the uncertain terrain, and the powerful act of choosing to move forward with resilience.

At Udayan Care, we've always believed that progress doesn't need to be loud. Sometimes it's a girl raising her hand in a classroom for the first time. A young man choosing work over hopelessness. A mother deciding to stay and fight for her child's future. These are the footsteps we celebrate.

In keeping with the overarching theme of family strengthening that each of our programs embodies, we continue to design interventions that place children and youth at the heart of supportive, nurturing family environments.

Through our **Child and Youth Care** Programs, we continue to provide not just shelter but a sense of belonging. **Our Udayan Ghars**, now 11 in number, have supported 189 children this year-children who may have arrived with broken pasts, but who now dream with open eyes. Where family restoration was possible, we reunited 281 children with their families, walking them back to the warmth of home. Our **Aftercare units** are home to 44 young adults raised in our Ghars, learning to navigate independence with dignity and support.

Our **Aftercare Outreach Program (AOP)**, covering youth coming out of other child care institutions, has expanded to a new chapter in Patna, making it to the 6th chapter. Across five states, AOP has now reached 330 care leavers, offering mentorship, life skills, mental health support, and job placements- over 166 of them now employed, standing tall in the world.

Through our **Families Together Program**, we continue our commitment to prevention. By working closely with 65 families in Delhi, we help keep children within the safety and familiarity of home, avoiding the disruption of institutionalisation. These steps, though quiet, are deeply impactful.

Our **Udayan Shalini Fellowship**, part of our Girls' Education and Empowerment initiative, strengthening families from low resourced backgrounds, now in its 21st year of transformation, has expanded to 36 chapters across 14 states, touching 17,000+ girls so far. In just this year alone, we supported over 7,500 girls. With a blend of mentoring, financial support, and personality development, the Fellowship enables young women chart their own paths, often becoming mentors to others in turn. Their footprints multiply hope.

In our **Skilling & Livelihood Program**, started with one centre in 2004, we focus on young people from underserved communities, so that their families are supported and looked after. At our 25 IT Centres, 3,530 youth enrolled this year, in the year 2024-2025 through the program 2,229 youth found employment. These are not just jobs- they bring with them the joy of the first pay cheque, the surge of self-worth, and the excitement of new beginnings in a young life. Many have gone on to support their families, becoming anchors of stability.

Our **Advocacy, Research and Training (ART)** vertical continues to push boundaries in alternative care. Through research, training, and policy engagement, we've worked closely with the state governments of Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, and Telangana, offering technical support on family-based care and aftercare frameworks. Our capacity-building efforts are building a skilled community of care providers across India.

Our academic journal, **Institutionalised Children Explorations and Beyond (ICB)**, now in its 23rd issue, remains a leading voice in care reform. Published biannually by Sage Publications and recognised by the UGC, it serves as a space for serious dialogue on the future of child and youth care, both in India and globally.

But footprints are never made alone. They are shaped by the ground that holds them, the hands that steady them, the voices that cheer them on. To our donors, partners, mentors, and team, you are the wind at the backs of those we serve. Your belief turns their steps into strides.

As we look ahead, I am reminded of a lesson our children have taught me time and again: the future is not some distant horizon. It is built today, in the classrooms where a girl masters a new equation, in the workshops where a care leaver learns a trade, in the quiet moments when a child realises, I am not alone.

So let us keep walking-together. Let us leave footsteps worth following.

Udayan Ghar Program



About the Program

Udayan Care began its transformative journey in 1996 with the establishment of its first Udayan Ghar (Home), built on the LIFE model (Living in Family Environment) that provides children without parental care with an authentic family environment. Children are nurtured by dedicated Mentor Parents—volunteers, who work alongside social workers and resident caregivers in strategically located homes within middle-class neighborhoods, facilitating natural community integration. Initially started as long-term homes for 'children without parental care,' Udayan Ghar's philosophy is

that children should be with their own families. Therefore, gatekeeping, restoration, and reintegration are major elements on which these homes are functioning.

With holistic care at its core, the program has transformed the lives of over 2,607 children across 4 states. At the beginning of the financial year, the program supported 172 children and 38 young adults in Aftercare in 13 homes. Two more homes were closed through the year, bringing the number to 11 homes by March 2025.

Need of the Program

"According to UNICEF data, India has 31 million orphaned and abandoned children, many of whom remain vulnerable due to gaps in institutional care, adoption processes, foster care systems, and mental health services" - EPRA International Journal of Research & Development (IJRD). To serve this cause Udayan Care runs licensed children's homes

for short-term and long-term care of such children. These children frequently experience developmental delays, educational gaps, and trauma, caregivers are prepared to offer both professional care and family-like relationships while preparing them for adoption, family reunification, or independent living.



Restoration and Reintegration

Udayan Care prioritizes restoring children to their biological families, whenever safe and feasible, beginning family tracing immediately upon a child's entry with Child Welfare Committee collaboration to identify relatives capable of providing stable care.

The program emphasizes community reintegration by placing homes in regular middle-class neighborhoods, enabling children to naturally integrate into local communities, attend neighborhood schools, and develop essential social skills that prepare them for successful independent living or family reunification.





Salient Features of Udayan Ghar

1. Community Orientation and Family Environment

Community Orientation and Family Environment: Udayan Ghars are located in middle-class neighborhoods to help children integrate into local life and develop social skills for independent living. Each home houses 10-12 children as a single unit (with double units in some homes), creating a family environment with personal attention, long-term mentoring, sibling relationships, and shared experiences that mirror a natural family setting.

2. Comprehensive Physical & Mental Health

Children receive initial comprehensive investigations, inoculations, followed by monthly and quarterly health check-ups. A specialized psychological team of counselors, led by Dr. Deepak Gupta (Child & Adolescent Psychiatrist), ensure every child receives the therapeutic attention needed for their healing journey and resilience building. Additional support to deal with different cases is provided by Ms. Helen Lenga (Australian Psychologist specializing in Trauma and Attachment).

3. Excellence in Education and Skill Development

Children receive educational support through schools, supplemented by dedicated tutoring and mentoring services. For those facing academic challenges or joining the program later in age, comprehensive vocational training ensures every child can build a strong foundation for future success.

4. Mentor Parents and Professional Staff

The homes maintain adequate staffing as per the Juvenile Justice Act, while lifetime committed volunteers, called mentor parents serve as additional support. Beyond the standard requirements to ensure comprehensive care and stability for every child, the team provides emotional foundation, guidance, and consistent love to help children heal from trauma and build secure relationships.

5 Capacity Building Programs

There are specialized training programs for all stakeholders including counselors, social workers, staff, mentor parents, children and youth, enhancing the overall quality of care through skill enhancement.

7 Volunteers and Interns Involvement

Active collaboration with prestigious national and international institutions, including Duke University and others, brings fresh perspectives, innovative approaches, and dedicated energy through committed volunteers and interns who contribute to the children's diverse learning experiences.

9 Expert Committees

Specialized decision-making committees for Alumni support, Aftercare services, and Education (including special needs) unite diverse expertise from mentors, professional staff, and external specialists. This collaborative approach ensures comprehensive, well-informed decisions that consider every aspect of child welfare and long-term success.

6 Child Participation

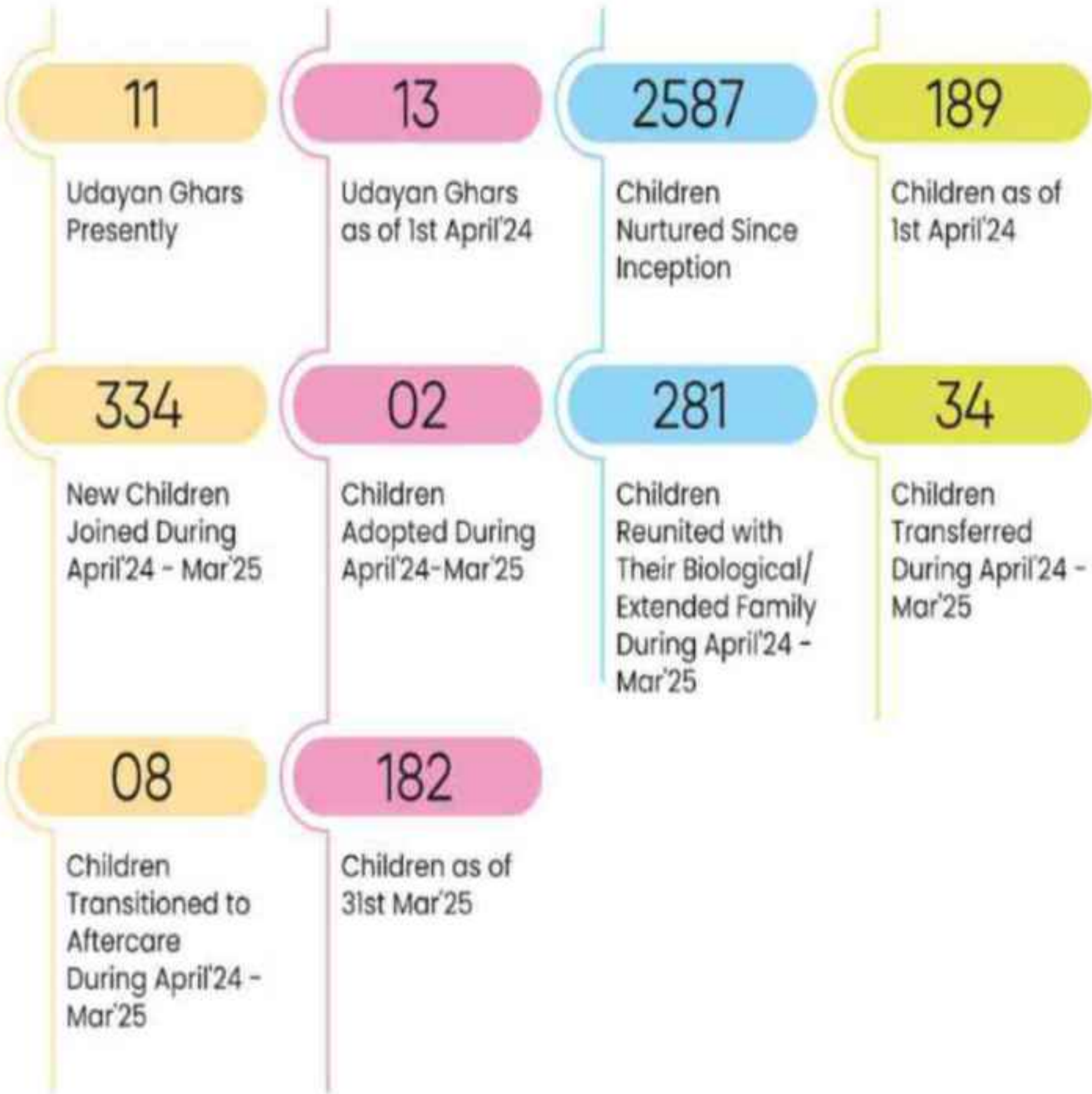
Child Participation: Management and Children's Committees provide platforms where children actively participate in decisions affecting their lives, developing communication skills, problem-solving abilities, and leadership confidence. 8 Quality Assurance and Monitoring

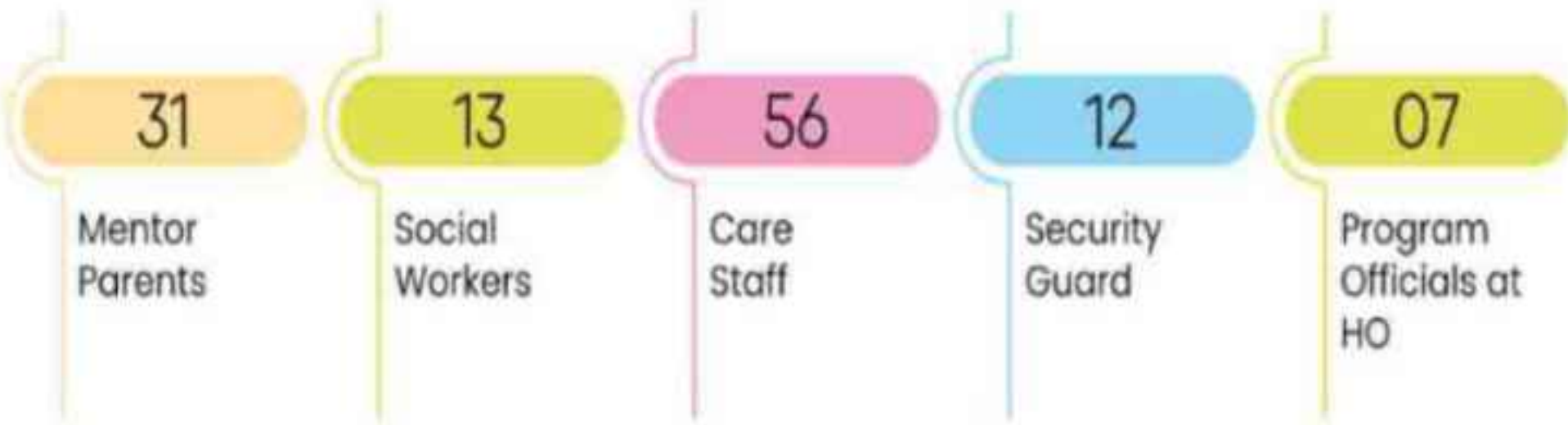

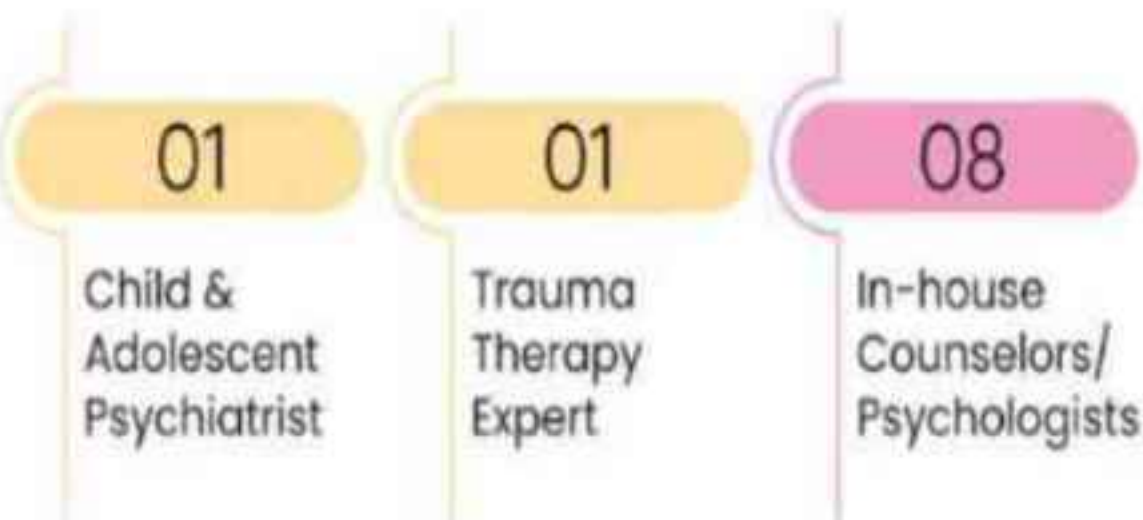

Annual Summer Camp 2024 “Suraj ki Baahon Mein”

Udayan Ghar's festive summer gathering united 190 children for an exciting four-day activities in Jagshanti Udayan Ghar, Greater Noida. The celebration, themed “Suraj Ki Baahon Mein,” featured energetic performances, martial arts training, and innovative learning modules. Children explored robotics, handicrafts, storytelling, and participated in motivational health seminars. Divided by age groups, participants actively joined debates, future planning exercises, and personal development workshops. The experience fostered teamwork, self-expression, and helped discover individual strengths while creating cherished memories. This comprehensive program balanced entertainment, education, and character building in a nurturing environment. The festivities culminated in a grand showcase where every child brilliantly presented their learned skills and creative accomplishments. 17th adidas – Udayan Care Annual Sports Day

The 17th adidas-Udayan Care Annual Sports Day celebrated twenty years of partnership with outdoor games and activities. Children participated eagerly, enjoyed the events, and received gifts for their efforts. Training Sessions with Children

Children participated in diverse workshops developing personal growth and life skills, including gratitude writing, self-care, assertive communication, self-defence, Art Reach creative activities, and many such, fostered curiosity and problem-solving. Programs covered emotional regulation, vision boards, financial literacy, career counseling, mental health awareness, boundary-setting, environmental conservation and nutrition, etc. Udayan Care's specialized courses on Skills for Independent Living (age 15-18) and Work Life Readiness (18-21) lodged on Passport to Earning (P2E), were a big resource for children. Online Stem classes also brought forth the wonders of science for the children



Sessions with Social Workers, Counselors and Caregivers

Our coordinators and caregivers attended various training sessions for professional development. Dr. Deepak Gupta conducted sessions on child abuse and trauma support, while staff received training on VR technology and financial reporting. The team participated in disaster management training, health assessments, and mental health awareness sessions. Helen Lenga's workshop series provided expertise in trauma and attachment theory, covering brain development and special needs support. Additional sessions covered gender awareness, child protection, child rights, cancer prevention, and mindful communication skills.

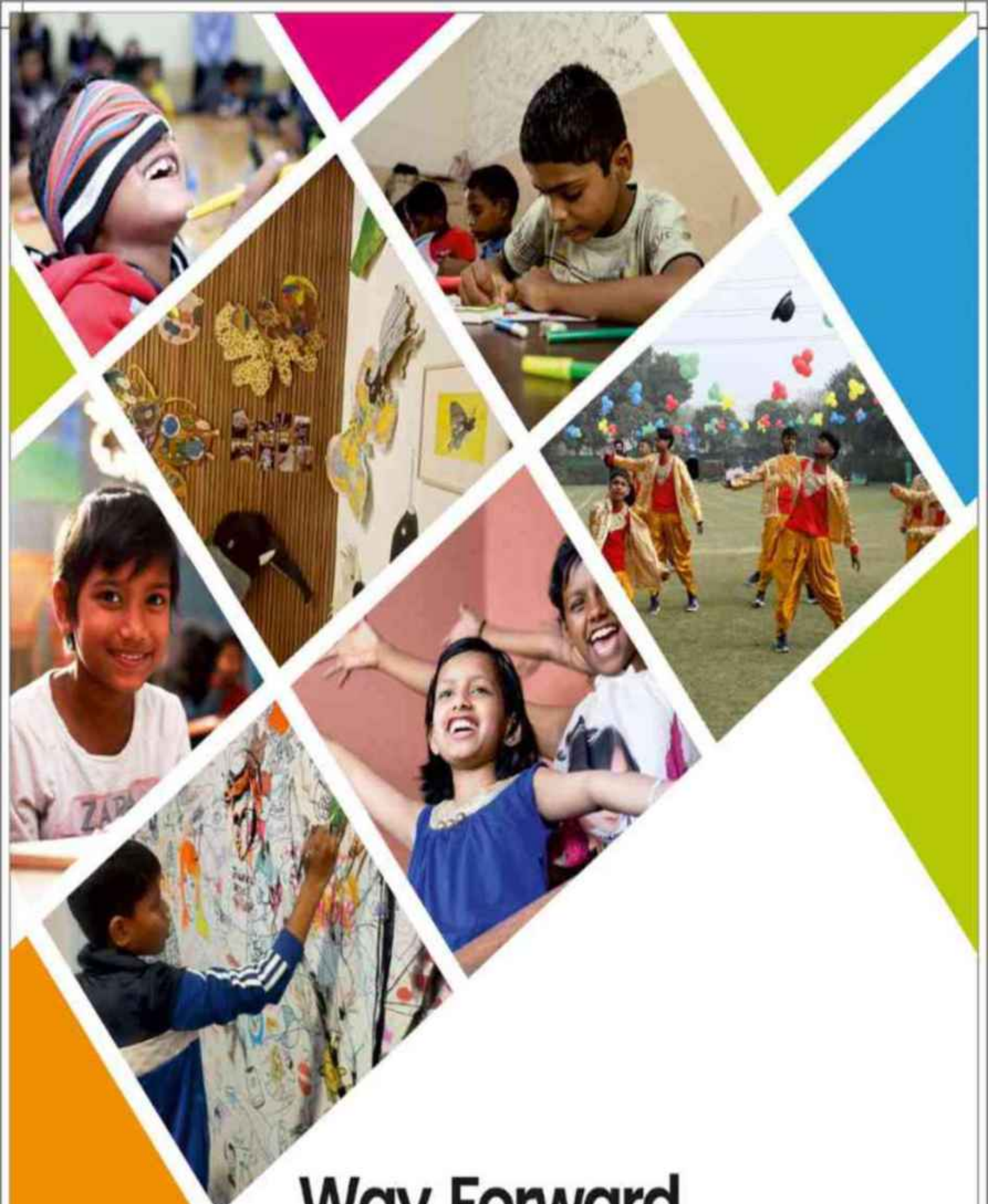
A Journey of Artistic Excellence

Shivam's Journey: From Lost to Found

Nine-year-old Shivam's remarkable transformation began when he was found by police near Wazirabad Red Light post in Gurugram on September 29, 2019, with no traceable family. Arriving at Udayan Care unable to read or write, he flourished under the dedicated guidance of the home team who secured his legal documents and enrolled him at Rose Land Public School. Through consistent effort and unwavering support, Shivam progressed from illiteracy to achieving an impressive 96% in fourth grade, ranking third in his class. Beyond academics, he discovered his talents as an anchor and also won prizes in writing and drawing competitions. With enhanced confidence built through counseling sessions on life skills, anger management, and child rights, Shivam actively participates in all recreational activities, embodying a complete transformation from a lost child to a bright, confident, and talented student—a testament to resilience and the power of a nurturing environment.



Way Forward

Udayan Care is committed to each child's well-being by placing and supporting children back in their families and those without family support giving them a family environment, a sense of belonging and holistic upbringing, and once out of homes, provide aftercare and alumni support.

About the Aftercare Program

The Udayan Care Aftercare Program was designed to guide young adults as they take their first steps from institutional care toward independent living. This is a defining stage of their lives—a time when they are eager to learn, make choices, and shape who they want to become.

Through this program, we ensure they receive the support they need to grow in every direction: academically, emotionally, and socially. The young adults who have spent their childhoods in Udayan Ghars continue to show remarkable strength and aspiration. Many are determined to set examples for others, proving the impact of sustained care beyond their early years.

At Udayan Care, we believe responsibility does not end when a young person turns 18. With consistent mentorship and a stable network around them, we walk beside our young adults as they pursue their ambitions and build lives rooted in confidence, dignity, and independence.

Objectives of the Program

Mentorship and Guidance

Mentorship is at the core of Udayan Care's support for young adults moving from Child Care Institutions into independent living. Through our Mentor Parent model, each young adult is paired with a dedicated mentor who offers more than direction—they provide emotional support, steady care, and a sense of parental presence. These mentors stand beside the youth as they navigate education, career decisions, life skills, and emotional challenges. By building a trusting, nurturing relationship, mentors create a space where young adults feel respected, understood, and confident enough to shape a stable and meaningful future. It creates a safe environment which empowers life.

Financial & Education Support

Financial support remains a key pillar of long-term care, extending even after young adults return to their families. Udayan Care ensures that they receive continued support for education and vocational training so their progress is not interrupted. This help stays in place until they secure steady employment and reach financial independence. Alongside monetary aid, the team provides emotional encouragement and regular follow-up, ensuring every young adult is supported throughout this sensitive transition toward self-reliance.

Rehabilitation and Reintegration

A central goal of the Aftercare Program is to guide young adults as they step out of institutional care and begin to live on their own. This period requires thoughtful support as they shift from adolescence into adulthood and learn to manage life beyond a structured environment. Udayan Care offers a stable and compassionate framework that helps them adjust with dignity and confidence, enabling them to reintegrate into society as empowered individuals.

Comprehensive and Holistic Support

To ensure well-rounded development, the program provides a wide range of services: academic support for higher education, vocational training, career counselling, job placement guidance, safe housing, and financial aid. Life skills—such as budgeting, communication, decision-making, and time management—form an essential part of this support. The program also helps young adults access legal aid and obtain identity documents, ensuring they can participate fully in society.

Health & Mental Health

The Aftercare Program places strong emphasis on the physical and mental well-being of every young adult. Regular health check-ups are carried out through partnerships with Dr. Dang's Lab, Mahajan Diagnostics, Delhi ENT, and local clinics and polyclinics near the Aftercare homes. These collaborations ensure timely medical care and preventive support. On the mental health front, the program continues to benefit from the long-standing guidance of Dr. Deepak Gupta, a leading child and adolescent psychiatrist who has supported Udayan Care for over two decades. His expertise helps address emotional and psychological needs through consistent counselling and mental health support.

With this integrated approach, young adults receive the holistic care they need to lead healthy, balanced, and empowered lives. Periodic counseling is also carried out by our in-house counselors.



Key Features



Safe Housing & Financial Aid

Provision of transitional housing and financial support for living expenses, rent, and other basic needs to ensure stability during the early phases of independence.



Legal and Identity Assistance

Support in obtaining necessary legal documents such as Aadhaar, PAN card, voter ID, and opening bank accounts to enable full civic and financial participation.



Educational Support & Skill Development & Vocational Support

Assistance with admissions, scholarships, and academic progress. Udayan Care partners with reputed institutions such as G.D. Goenka University, BML Munjal University, Lovely Professional University, Delhi Skill Entrepreneurship University (DSU), and others to provide quality higher education opportunities to young adults. Young Adults (YAs) are enrolled in certified training programs to build job-ready skills. Udayan Care collaborates with partners like Navgurukul (Bangalore Campus), MCKS Saathiya (Delhi and Bangalore Campuses), to provide practical training in fields such as technology, hospitality, and soft skills.



Alumni Network & Mentorship

Even after completing the Program, YAs remain connected through a strong alumni network, receiving continued mentorship, guidance, and emotional support through key life transitions. A life long network that offers continued emotional support and community belonging.



Aftercare Achievements

Over the years, Aftercare Program has continued to shape the lives of young adults who have grown up in long-term care, helping them step into independence with dignity and direction. Our commitment remains steady: to ensure every young adult has the support, stability, and opportunities they need to build a meaningful future. In turn, the young adults have shown remarkable drive, discipline, and determination as they work toward their goals.

This year brought several important milestones. Many pursued higher education, secured employment, and some began new phases of their personal lives through marriage. Six young adults earned admission to well-regarded colleges with scholarships. Among them, Iqra from Home 1, Vikram Vihar, received a scholarship from her school to study at Ritsumeikan University in Japan. Yashvi also earned a full scholarship to Ashoka University.

Beyond financial support, Udayan Care places strong emphasis on building skills, identifying each young adult's strengths, and arranging internships that provide meaningful exposure to professional settings. A major highlight this year was the transition of 6 young adults out of the Aftercare facility. Each one moved into independent living with a stable job, marking a confident step into self-reliance and adulthood.

Events: Aftercare & Alumni

On 28th December 2024, we held our Annual Alumni Meet—a gathering that continues to reaffirm the lifelong bond our alumni share with Udayan Care. Even after reintegration into society, they remain closely connected to the organisation, guiding younger care leavers and serving as steady sources of support and inspiration. The Annual Alumni Day provides space for them to reflect on their journeys, share their experiences, and reconnect with the larger Udayan family.

Our alumni remain an important part of our community, and we ensure their involvement throughout the year in events such as Sports Day, festive Diwali visits, and other celebrations that keep these ties strong and meaningful.

In addition to the alumni gathering, a series of workshops on emotional well-being was conducted by the Duke University team. These sessions saw active participation from all the youth, who spoke openly about their thoughts, feelings, and mental health experiences. The workshops created a safe and supportive environment, encouraging honest conversations and building empathy among participants. By reducing stigma and strengthening peer connection, these sessions helped young adults reflect, learn, and build emotional resilience.

Held on Sundays through July 2024, the workshops made effective use of the weekends to focus on personal growth and mental well-being.

Goals

Enable Independent, Stable, and Dignified Living:

Support Young Adults as they move from child care institutions into independent life by ensuring safe housing, essential resources, life skills, and long-term stability.

Foster Holistic Well-being:

Strengthen mental, emotional, and physical health through regular counseling, healthcare access, and wellness activities that build resilience and confidence.

Empower Through Education and Career Development:

Provide pathways to higher education, scholarships, skill-building courses, and vocational training, along with support for job placements, internships, and entrepreneurship to help YAs achieve financial independence.

Provide Consistent Mentorship and Emotional Guidance:

Connect each young adult with committed mentors who offer emotional support, career direction, and a sense of parental care—ensuring they feel understood, valued, and supported.

Encourage Social Integration and Responsible Citizenship:

Equip YAs with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to participate fully and responsibly in society as contributing citizens.

Ensure Continuous Growth and Tailored Support:

Track each YA's progress closely and offer personalized guidance to help them overcome challenges and achieve their personal and professional goals.

Lives We Transformed

At Udayan Care, we continue to stand beside young adults as they navigate one of the most defining stages of their lives—the transition to independent adulthood. Over the years, more than 200 youth have moved out of our care with the skills, confidence, and support needed to build self-reliant futures.

In 2024–25, seven young adults took this step forward and secured meaningful employment as they transitioned out of the Aftercare Program. Our college-going youth also made steady progress, taking up internships that strengthened their professional abilities and expanded their career opportunities.

This year brought notable academic milestones as well—five young adults earned scholarships to prestigious universities, opening doors to quality education and new possibilities.

One of the most touching moments came when a young adult from our Aftercare facility began a new phase of life through marriage, settling independently with dignity and hope.

Each of these milestones is more than an achievement—they are stories of resilience, determination, and transformation that reflect the true spirit of Udayan Care.

Shining Stars



Yashvi's story of brilliance and perseverance

Yashvi's journey with Udayan Care began at the age of four, marking the start of a remarkable transformation. She laid a strong academic foundation at Deep Memorial Public School, scoring an impressive 92% in her Class 10 examinations. She then progressed to Dalhousie Public School in Himachal Pradesh, where she was honored as the Best Student of the Year in Class 11 and achieved 96% in Class 12. Her consistent dedication and excellence earned her a 100% scholarship to Ashoka University, where she is now pursuing a Bachelor's degree in Liberal Arts. Yashvi's story stands as a testament to her resilience, determination, and the steadfast support she received through Udayan Care.



Iqra's story of courage and determination

Iqra's early years were fraught with emotional struggles and behavioral challenges, often leaving her feeling lost and unheard. Yet, with consistent guidance and her own growing determination, she began to rewrite her story. The turning point came when she set her sights on higher education abroad. With steadfast support from her school-through exam preparation, paperwork, multiple interviews and continued mentoring at Udayan Care-Iqra overcame every hurdle and earned a 100% scholarship to Ritsumeikan University in Japan, where she is now pursuing Polyscience. From uncertainty to accomplishment, Iqra's journey stands as a testament to the power of belief, support, and resilience.

About the Program

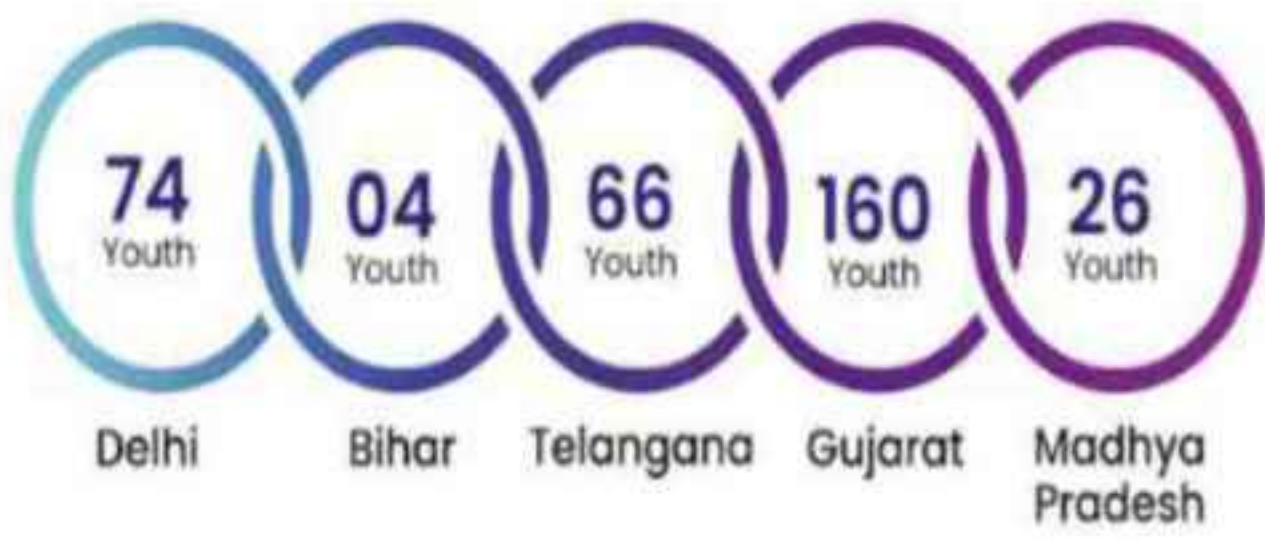
The Aftercare Outreach Program (AOP) is a pioneering initiative that empowers young individuals transitioning from Child Care Institutions (CCIs) and Alternative Care into independent adulthood. Since its launch in 2020, AOP has impacted over 714 care leavers, offering tailored support that nurtures self-reliance, dignity, and long-term success. Operating through six regional chapters, the program creates a safety net of community, mentorship, and opportunity, ensuring no care leaver faces adulthood alone. AOP's holistic approach integrates academic and vocational training, bridging the gap between education and employability.

We launched our first Aftercare Resource Hub in Delhi—a dedicated space designed to empower care leavers, with a focused emphasis on supporting young women. The facility offers safe accommodation for 13 girls, fostering security and dignity during their journey to independence. It integrates vocational training, life skills, and recreational activities to promote holistic development.



Transformative Bootcamps for Care Leavers

We conducted two residential bootcamps, engaging 67 Care Leavers in immersive, multi-day learning experiences. These camps enabled the Care Leavers to explore their SWOT profiles, identify career pathways, and strengthen skills and educational goals. These bootcamps provided a safe, reflective space for Care Leavers to envision their potential and take actionable steps toward independence. This initiative reflects our commitment to empower youth through experiential learning and strategic guidance.

Events and Sessions



Learning and Exposure Visit - Across AOP chapters in Telangana, Gujarat, and Madhya Pradesh, exposure visits were organized to enhance Care Leavers' professional and personal development. These included visits to corporate offices, vocational institutes, hospitality setups, and community enterprises.

hospitality setups, and community enterprises. Care Leavers gained firsthand insights into workplace culture, career pathways, and essential soft skills.



State Level Consultation on Aftercare - In Delhi, CHETNA, Salaam Baalak Trust, and Udayan Care partnered to strengthen aftercare through a second consultation held in January 2024. The event engaged over 150 stakeholders, including government bodies, NGOs, skilling institutes, and Care Leavers. They showcased a collaborative

collaborative aftercare model, amplified youth voices, and built momentum for systemic change.



Engagement with Stakeholders - A Collaborative Meeting brought together 25 changemakers from 11 organizations to deepen partnerships for care leaver support. Key outcomes included the launch of the Care Leavers Advocacy Network (CLAN), a Resource Directory on Aftercare, and exploration of Mission Vatsalya Funds. The

initiated individualised care plans to ensure seamless, rights-based aftercare support.



On 28th January 2025, Udayan Care hosted a roundtable conference with key stakeholders, including DCPOs, employers, and government representatives, to advance youth development. Dr. Kiran Modi highlighted the impact of partnerships with Micron Technologies and the innovative P2E module by UNICEF. A care leaver's

story and a video clip underscored the urgency of state support, with an appeal made by the chief guest to strengthen aftercare efforts.



Shining Stars



Deepshikha

Deepshikha's courageous decision to report domestic violence in 2021 marked the beginning of her journey toward independence and self-reliance. With AOP's placement and financial support, she joined Neev Foundation as an Administrative Officer, earning ₹15,000 with scope for growth. After being placed in a child care institution, she supported herself as a gym receptionist while living alone. Her drive led her to Udayan Care's AOP, where she completed vocational training in social work and gained essential digital skills. Deepshikha's story exemplifies how targeted guidance and resilience can transform lives and inspire others.



Keerthi

Keerthi's journey is a powerful testament to resilience and the transformative impact of timely support, making it a compelling fit for an annual report. After losing her father to illness, Keerthi's family faced severe emotional and financial strain, leading to her placement in a Child Care Institution. Despite these challenges, she excelled academically and pursued a BBA with support from AOP. Her passion for digital marketing led to vocational training, followed by enrollment in an MBA through distance learning. Reunited with her mother, Keerthi began working as a Communication Executive at Kloudwifi, earning ₹18,000 monthly while continuing her studies. Her story reflects not only personal triumph but also the success of youth-focused interventions, inspiring others to believe in the power of opportunity and perseverance.

Ankush Dayal

Ankush Dayal's journey from a Child Care Institution in Itarsi to financial independence is a powerful story of resilience and transformation. Orphaned, young and raised in poverty, Ankush joined Udayan Care's Aftercare Program at 18, having already scored 72.4% in his 12th standard. With no formal skills but immense potential, he was enrolled in foundational computer and personality development training. He later completed an Accounts Executive course at ITVT Udayan Care while pursuing a B.Com degree at Unique College. Today, Ankush works as an Accounts Assistant at JMG Global, earning ₹15,000/month and preparing for his university exams. He has also secured his legal identity, ensuring access to essential services. Ankush's story reflects the power of targeted support and personal grit in shaping a dignified, self-reliant future.



Learning in Fellowship Together (LIFT)



About the Program

The Learning in Fellowship Together (LIFT) program is a one-year fellowship that equips care leavers across India to become changemakers and leaders in child care reform. By nurturing their passion and strengthening their skills, LIFT empowers them to pursue their dreams while actively contributing to reshaping care systems in the country.

Since its inception, the program has supported 36 care leavers. In FY 2024-25, it successfully completed three cohorts and is currently supporting 16 fellows from 11 states—marking a significant milestone in its growth and impact.

The discussions highlighted pressing needs, such as employment support, mental health services, and consistent mentorship, as essential for creating a lasting impact. The initiative was supported by several partner organizations, including Make a Difference, Miracle Foundation, SAARTHI, and We Live Foundation.

Fellow's Stories



Arun

Growing up without a traditional family support system, Arun never imagined finding a space where he would feel truly seen and supported. Through his journey with LIFT, he discovered not just opportunities but also a sense of belonging. Surrounded by peers with shared struggles and aspirations, he found guidance, inspiration, and direction.

Now pursuing a B.A. (Hons) in Political Science at Delhi University, Arun worked on his project "Uncovering the Hidden Potential of Youth," which empowers care-experienced young people. What once was a quiet interest—public speaking—has now become one of his strongest skills.

Reflecting on his growth, Arun says, "LIFT didn't just give me tools, it gave me belief. For the first time, I saw myself not as a care leaver, but as a leader."



Anand

Anand, a passionate advocate for care leavers. Having experienced the challenges of transitioning from institutional care himself, he understands the struggles many young people face.

Through LIFT, supported by Udayan Care and UNICEF, Anand gained crucial life skills, mentorship, and leadership opportunities that enabled him to amplify the voices of care leavers nationwide. In November, he spoke at the Mentoring Summit at the Bangalore International Center, organized by Mentors Together. This prestigious platform allowed him to share his personal journey and highlight the transformative role of mentorship. The summit also connected him with influential leaders and strengthened his commitment to advocating for careleavers' rights.

Reflecting on the experience, Anand shared, "Mentorship gave me the confidence to shape my future. Through LIFT, I found purpose—supporting others like me to thrive."





FiT Families Together

About the Program

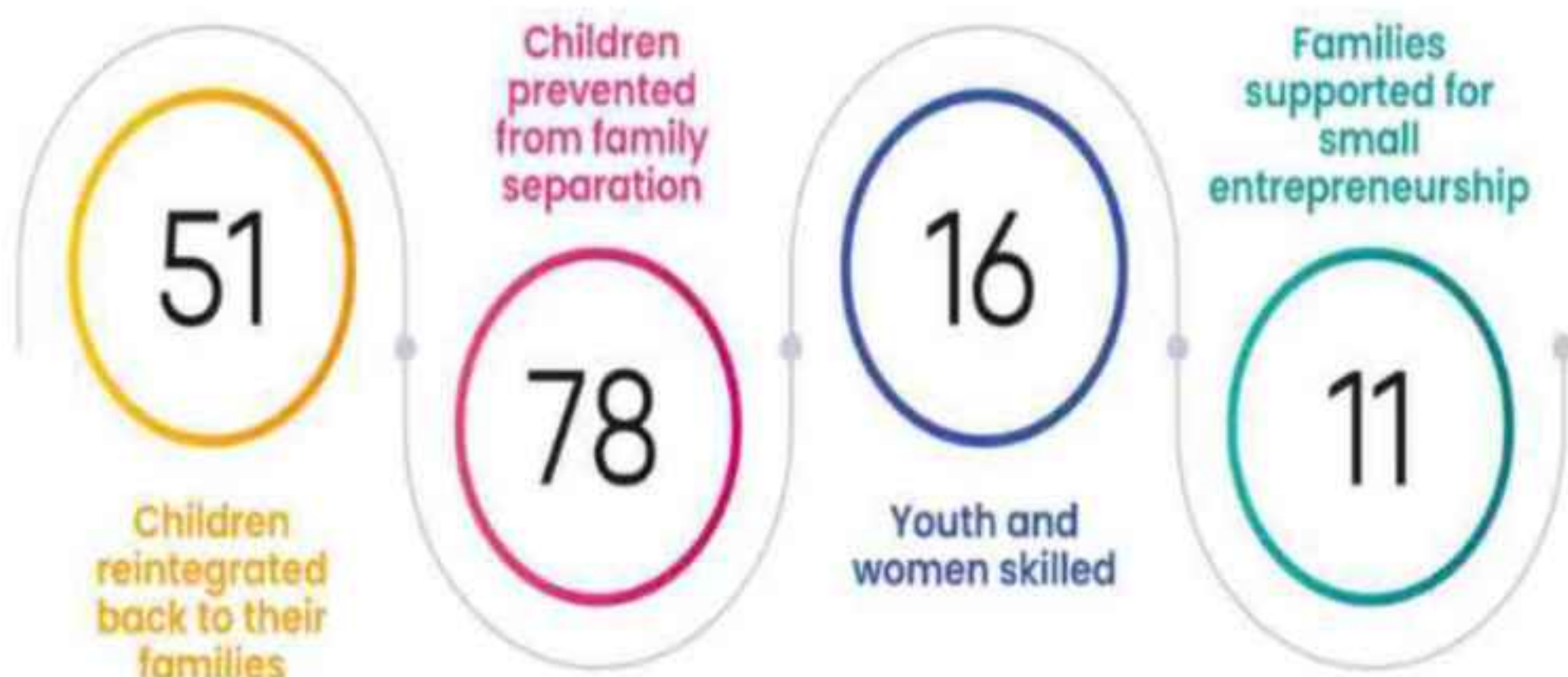
The FiT Families Together Project is a community-based family strengthening initiative that began in response to the rapid restoration of children from Child-Care Institutions (CCIs) back to their families during COVID-19 often with limited assessment and follow-up, to provide proper family reintegration support. Today, the project addresses both preventive and rehabilitative aspects of child protection, working with families to ensure every child grows up in a safe, nurturing, and supportive environment—guided by the 10 domains of the Circle of Care and Protection framework.

Currently active in Delhi's South, Southeast, and East districts, the project has reached 1,232 children, youth, and caregivers. Among them, 177 are now "paying it forward," extending support to others in their communities.

Circle of Care and Protection



Key Highlights of 2024-25



We have scaled the FiT Families Together model to East Delhi, reaching 200 vulnerable children across 40 families through our Circle of Care and Protection framework, supported by the Azim Premji Foundation.



This year also marked a significant milestone with the formation of the Delhi State Network on Family Strengthening, bringing together 23 members—including NGOs, individual experts, and academicians—committed to helping families stay together. The network functions as a sub-working group under India Alternative Care Network, with Agape Blessed Foundation as the convenor and Udayan Care as co-convenor.

Events and Sessions



We held 17 community meetings in intervention areas, engaging 294 children, parents, service providers, and key influencers to strengthen gatekeeping mechanisms and ensure children continue to thrive within their families.

In collaboration with the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA), we also organised a series of mega health and legal camps, where 340 individuals received vital support—including financial and legal aid, as well as essential health screenings such as oral, breast, and cervical cancer check-ups, along with eye and dental care.





Strong Families



From separation to strength: A family reunited—A family of six was living in a makeshift shelter near a temple in Delhi. The parents were struggling with unstable housing, limited income, and health challenges. As their living conditions worsened, three children were eventually placed in a Child Care Institution (CCI) for their safety and care. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the three siblings were quickly reunited with their family, who were still living

in the same makeshift shelter. The **FiT Families Together Project** stepped in to support the family's reunification. Understanding the layered challenges that had led to their separation, the project adopted a holistic, family-centered approach focusing on restoring both economic and emotional stability. The father and eldest son were supported in securing steady employment, the children were re-enrolled in school and skill-based training, and the family was helped to move into a rented home. Regular counselling sessions strengthened parenting skills and family relationships, rebuilding confidence and trust. Today, all three children are continuing their education, with the eldest training to become a gym instructor. The family has achieved financial stability, emotional resilience, and a renewed sense of togetherness. Once dependent on aid, they now seek only occasional guidance and have become advocates for family-based care within their own community. This story stands as a testament to the power of prevention and reintegration. By addressing vulnerabilities at their root and providing sustained support, the **FiT Families Together Project** helped this family avoid relapse into institutional care, ensuring that the children continue to grow, learn, and thrive where they belong within their family.



Brewing hope: A grandmother's strength, a family's stability—After losing their father and with their mother's remarriage, four young siblings faced the threat of separation and possible institutionalisation. Their 55-year-old grandmother, despite her age and limited means, stepped forward to become their primary caregiver. With unyielding determination, she sustained the family through seasonal labour and her modest

widow's pension, ensuring that all four children continued their education. When she shared her long-cherished dream of restarting a small tea stall—a venture she had once run successfully, the **FiT Families Together Project** recognised both her resilience and her vision for self-reliance. Through targeted livelihood support, the project helped her purchase equipment and set up the stall at a busy spot outside Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium, a location ideal for regular customers. Her dedication soon paid off. The stall began earning a steady income, restoring financial security and dignity to the household. Today, she runs it with pride and perseverance, often joined by her grandchildren after school, turning the space into a symbol of both livelihood and love. By supporting the grandmother's livelihood and reinforcing her capacity as a kinship caregiver, the **FiT Families Together Project** ensured that the children were not separated or institutionalised. Instead, they continue to grow up in a nurturing family environment surrounded by care, stability, and hope. This story is a testament to how economic empowerment can preserve families and transform futures.





State Programs

About the Program

We provide technical and on-ground support to State Governments to develop policies, guidelines, and training modules that strengthen Family-Based Alternative Care and Aftercare. Our work includes creating demonstration models on standards of care and transition planning at Child Care Institutions, as well as Aftercare and rehabilitation models at the non-institutional level to support independent living.

We also build the capacity of Child Protection Functionaries to scale these models at the state level, enabling the effective implementation of related programs and schemes in Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Telangana, and Gujarat.

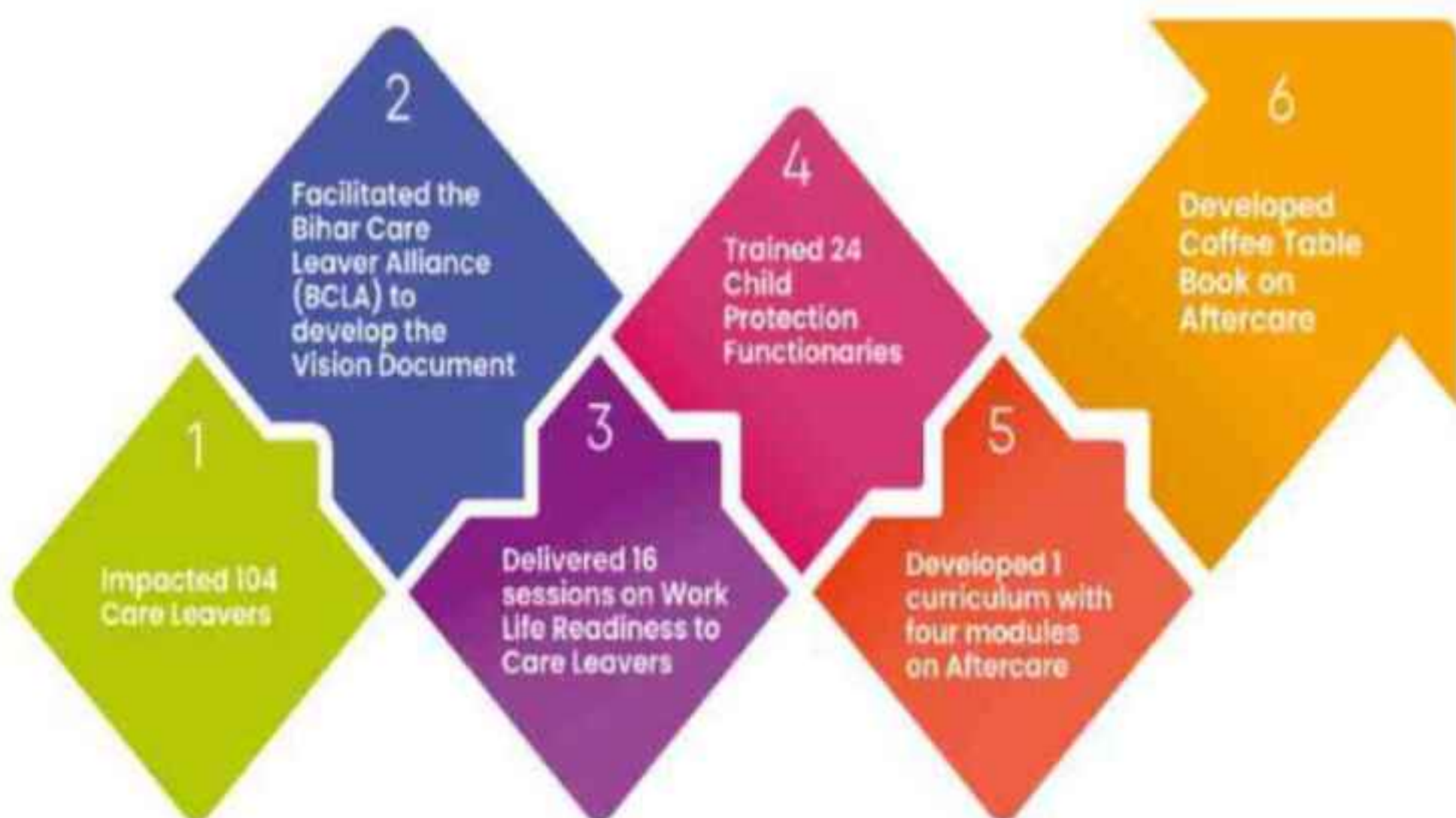




Highlights of the year

Madhya Pradesh

1. Advocacy led to the State Government designating District Nodal Officers on Aftercare (DNOA) with a clear Terms of Reference (ToR) specifying their responsibilities and impacted 586 Care Leavers.
2. Trained 905+ Child Protection Functionaries on various aspects of Child Protection and Aftercare
3. Supported partners in developing the "Agrani" module on the Gender Transformative Approach
4. Supported partners in developing the "Agrani" module on the Gender Transformative Approach
5. After 4 years of providing technical assistance, in collaboration with UNICEF, we achieved a significant milestone by entering into a formal MoU with the Department of Women and Child Development, Government of Madhya Pradesh, for the first time to strengthen Family-Based Alternative Care, including Aftercare, across the state.
6. Facilitated Yuva Shakti Sangathan to develop the Annual Action Plan 2025-2026





1. Advocacy led to signing a formal MoU with the State Government to train the district Child Protection Functionaries on various aspects of Child Protection and Family-Based Alternative Care.
2. Trained a cohort of 30 Master Trainers on various aspects of Child Protection and Family-Based Alternative Care
3. Master Trainers have conducted 85 training sessions, reaching 2,975 district Child Protection Functionaries.



Advocacy on Aftercare: We successfully convened two district-level and one state-level consultations to strengthen Aftercare and economic empowerment for Care Leavers. We reached out to approximately 150 Child Protection Functionaries, including government officials, NGOs, employers, and youths. The platforms enabled care leavers to share their stories, driving greater government engagement and fostering collaborative solutions around key issues

such as documentation, housing, and employability. Collectively, these efforts advanced advocacy and policy dialogue to better support care leavers across the state.



Collaboration for Palak Mata Pita Yojana (PMPY Scheme) Evaluation- We are partnering with the Central University of Gujarat to evaluate a UNICEF-supported project and assess the impact of the PMPY scheme. We're conducting an in-depth study in the Banaskantha district of Gujarat, strengthening evidence for family-based care and improving practices for vulnerable children and youth.



Care Champion

Mr. Mukul Kumar, Child Protection Officer, District Child Protection Unit (DCPU), Patna, has played a key role in strengthening child protection systems in Bihar over the past decade.

He has been closely engaged with Udayan Care over the last five years through multiple capacity-building efforts. He served as a Master Trainer for developing Individual Care Plans (ICPs) and took part in several trainings, including an exposure visit to Rajasthan organised by Udayan Care, focused on Aftercare, Planning to Execution (P2E), and Individual Aftercare Plans (IAPs).

His consistent support and proactive leadership have helped integrate structured aftercare planning across Child Care Institutions (CCIs) in Patna. Under his guidance:

1. Hundreds of children have been linked to Sponsorship Schemes, allowing them to remain in safe, family-based settings.
2. More than 90 children have been placed with adoptive families, giving them stable, permanent homes.
3. 19 Care Leavers in Patna are now receiving Aftercare Funds to support their transition to independent living.
4. Care Leavers have received regular mentoring, emotional support, and motivation through coordinated efforts of the DCPU.

Mr. Kumar has also supported Udayan Care's LIFT Fellows in Bihar, ensuring timely access to identity documents for Care Leavers—an essential step for education, employment, and social benefits.

We value the commitment of officials like Mr. Mukul Kumar, whose work shows that meaningful system change is possible when leadership is rooted in responsibility and care.

About Education and Empowerment

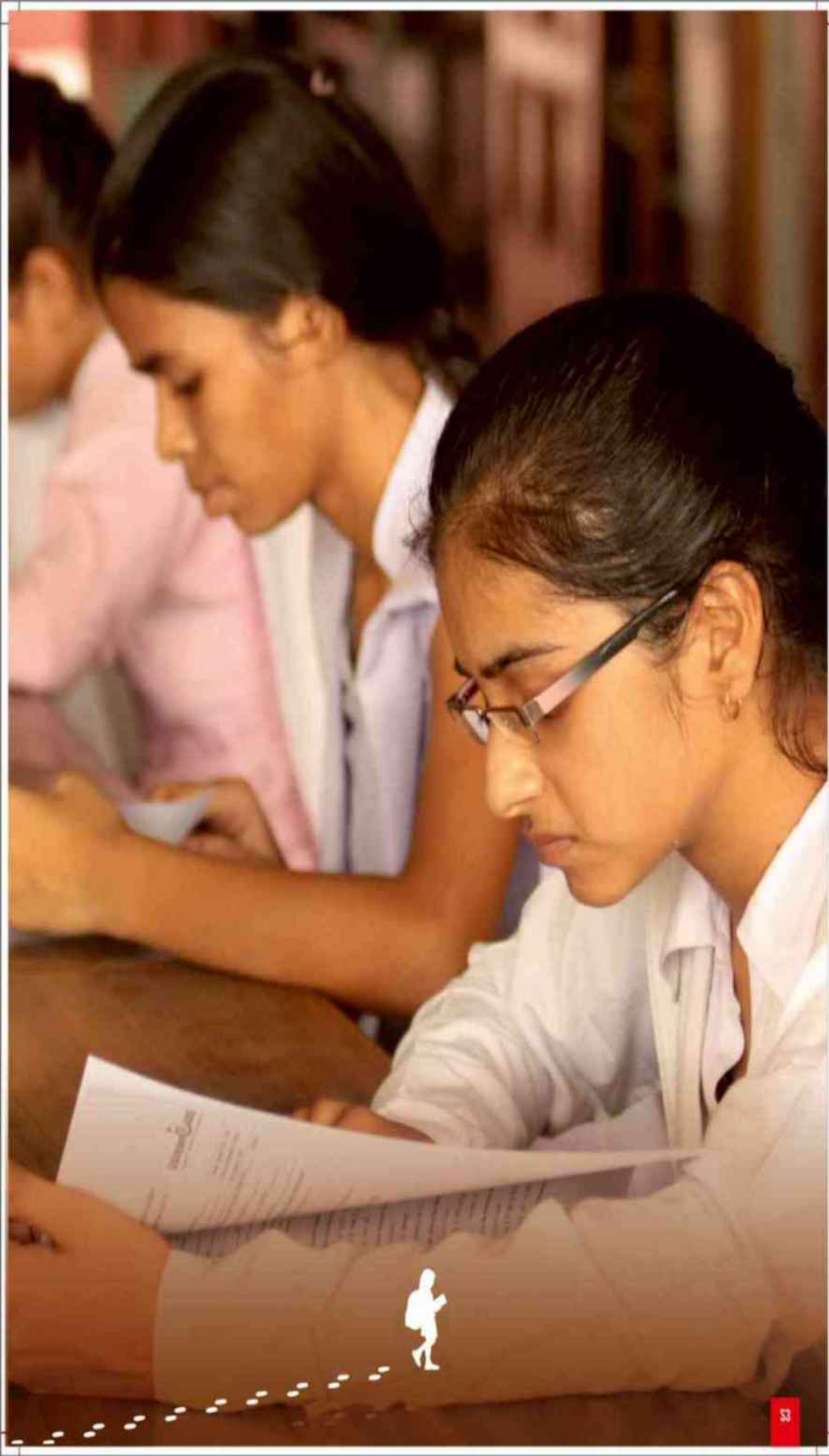

Through the Udayan Shalini Fellowship Program (USF), we support the education of young girls from underserved backgrounds, helping them break through the barriers that often hold them back. We enable them to become future leaders and changemakers.

Going beyond financial support, USF offers much more than financial support. It builds a strong network of mentorship, guidance, and opportunities that encourages girls to think critically, act with confidence, and shape their own future. True empowerment comes from both inner strength and external opportunities. The Fellowship focuses on leadership, communication skills, resilience, and strong values—preparing each fellow for life, not just exams. In a world where gender and poverty can limit dreams, USF serves as a powerful force that opens doors—not just to

higher education, but to spaces where girls are heard, their ambitions are supported, and their sense of self is strengthened.

Like footprints forging a path, every step these girls take—in the classroom, on stage, or within their communities—leaves an enduring mark, shaping tomorrow. One courageous step can change everything, and every Shalini moves forward: learning, leading, and paving the way with pride. In their journey of growth, even the smallest actions build towards a brighter future. Their resilience, determination, and hope today are the very foundation for the leaders they will become.

In 2024–25, the program continued to uphold its mission of turning access to education into lifelong empowerment. Every girl who becomes a 'Shalini' embarks on a journey of growth—moving from simply surviving in a limiting environment to thriving as an informed, capable, and socially conscious individual.



About the Program

The Udayan Shalini Fellowship (USF) Program, by Udayan Care, combines academic excellence with employability training and leadership development for deserving and talented girls from economically weaker backgrounds. It aims to transform them into empowered, confident, financially independent, and dignified women- Shalinis.

USF goes beyond a regular scholarship. It offers personalised mentoring, capacity building, and volunteering opportunities to develop a sense of social responsibility. With a focus on employability, the program provides corporate exposure, internships, and placement opportunities. The program also builds linkages and partnerships to provide academic support and upskilling.

Launched in 2002 in Delhi with just 72 girls, the program has grown. To date, USF has supported more than 17,000+ bright and deserving girls from financially constrained families. Today, it offers 36 chapters across 14 states in India, even as it reaches more communities and transforms more lives each year.

The program continues to guide Shalinis and their families in skill-building and preparing for professional careers. Workshops have covered a range of topics—such as Positive Language, Career Awareness, and Communication—enabling Shalinis not only to grow themselves but also to share their knowledge with others.

To provide them with practical exposure, visits to companies and institutions were organized, enabling them to gain a better understanding of the corporate world. New mentors, including committed alumni, have joined the program, adding fresh perspectives and relatability to the mentoring process.

The program is passionately supported by an army of volunteers in the form of core committees, convenors, mentors, resource persons, and alumni (mentor didis). Donors and partners remain essential to this journey. Their ongoing support enables the program to expand its reach and further its mission of empowering girls through education.

Need for the Program

Despite progress in many areas, the educational gap between boys and girls in India persists as a significant issue. According to the National Statistical Office (NSO, 2021), only 8.3% of women aged 15 and above have completed graduation, and nearly one in five girls has never attended school. For many, education is cut short by the early onset of unpaid domestic work—about 65% of these girls take on household responsibilities from a young age, as reported by the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (2018).

The impact of educational exclusion is far-reaching. Data from the National Family Health Survey-5 (2019–21) shows that 14.7% of young women in urban areas and 27% in rural India were married before turning 18. With more than 24 million child brides, India

accounts for 40% of the world's total—a stark reminder of the urgent need for change.

Investing in girls' education is not just the right thing to do—it is a powerful driver of transformation. When girls remain in school, rates of child marriage and early motherhood drop sharply. The benefits ripple outward—improving health outcomes, boosting economic growth, and creating stronger, more equitable communities.

Education equips girls to make informed choices, participate actively in society, and lead lives of dignity and independence. Empowering girls through education is one of the most effective nation-building strategies we have—because when a girl learns, her family and community move forward with her.

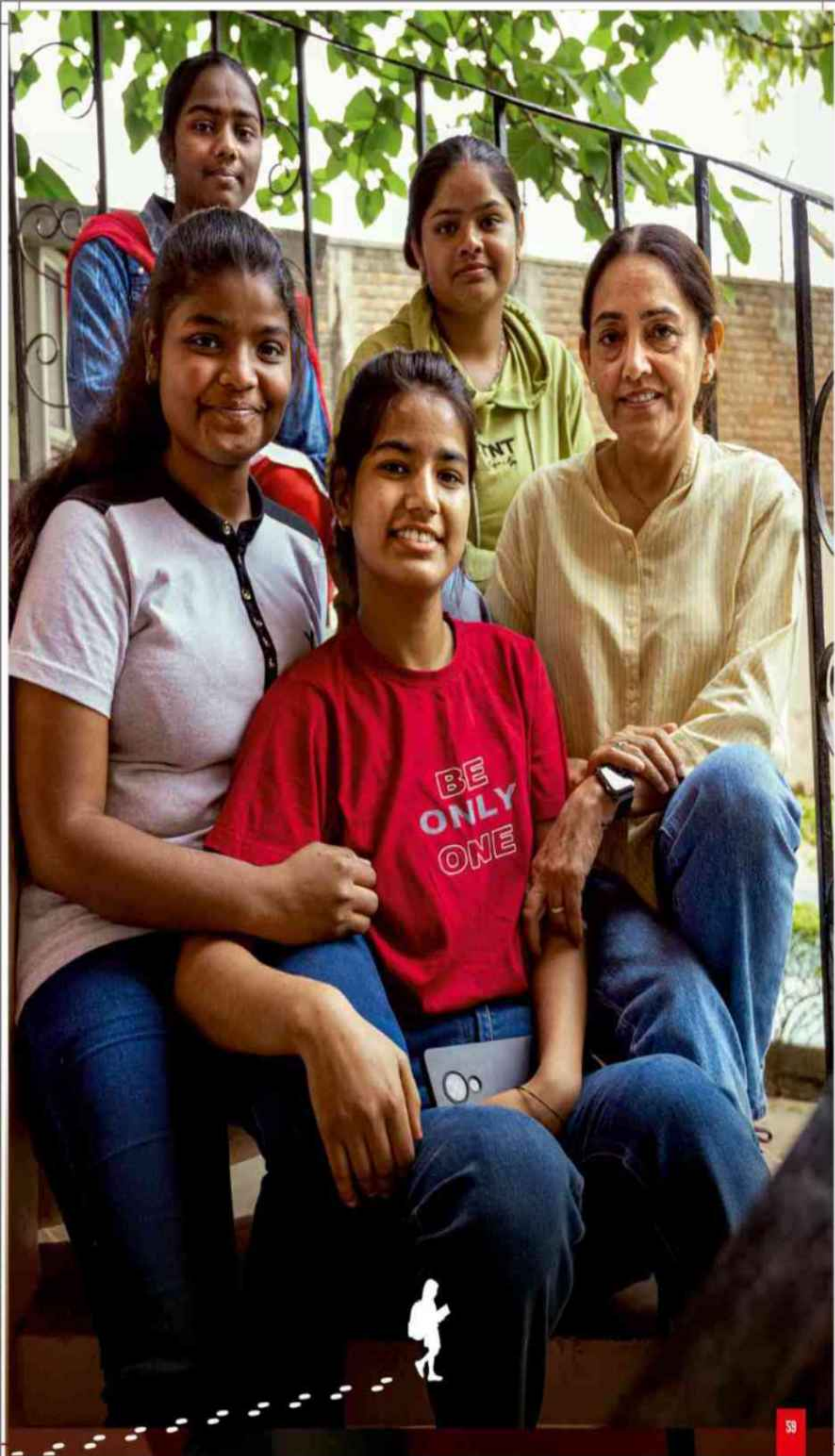

Direct stipend to Shalinis for education, ensuring financial ease By alleviating financial constraints, we ensure young women continue pursuing education without worrying about financial instability.



Volunteer Support

Committed and inspired individuals who enable and strengthen the program In every chapter, inspired Convenors lead, forming Core Committees. With time and commitment, they tap into their networks for support, engage local schools, and guide staff, committee members, and mentors.



Paying it Forward

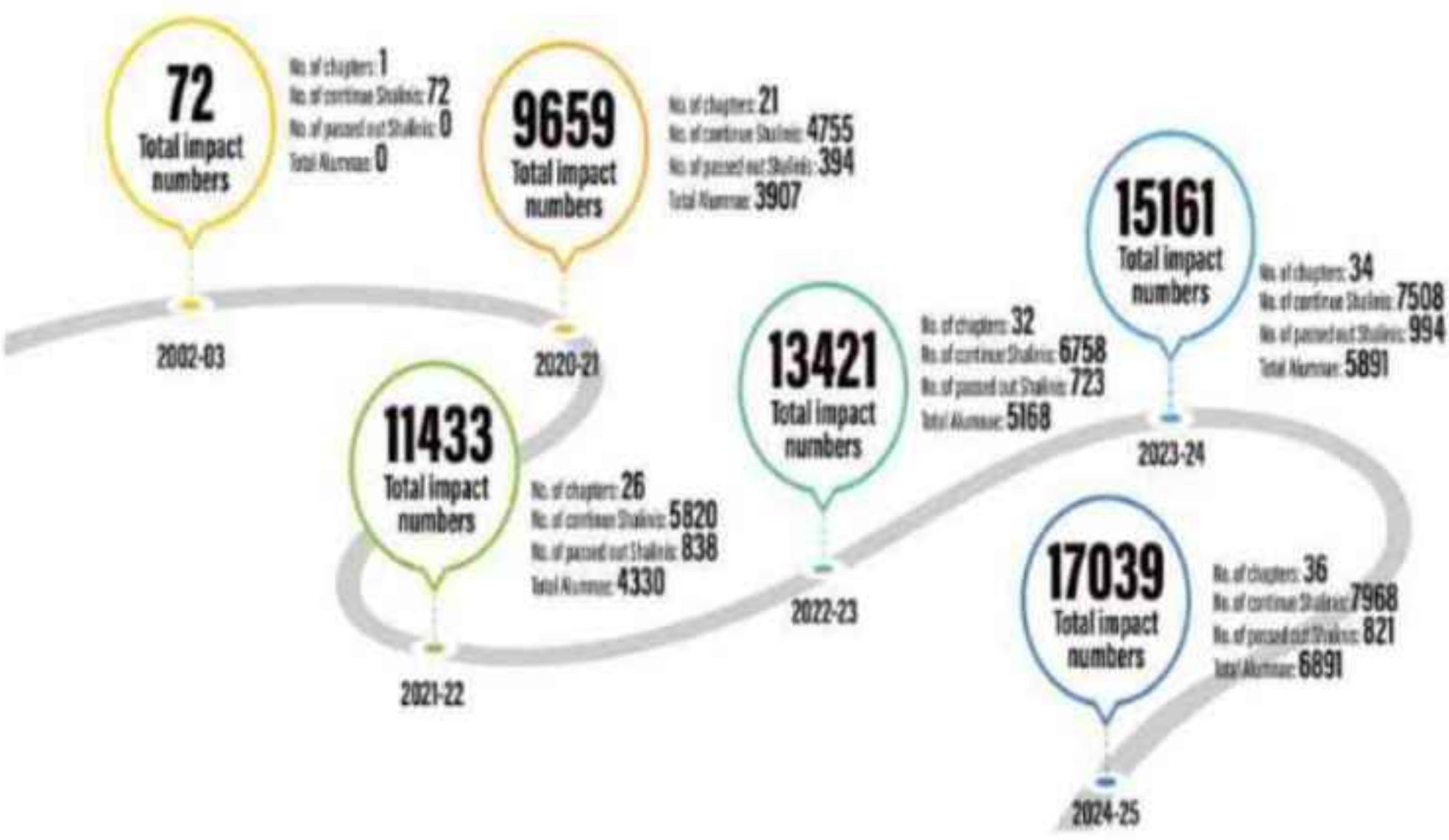

NAT Model

Girls are selected for the program through the NAT Model, which stands for Need, Ambition, and Talent. This is done through screening of application forms, written test, personal interviews and home visits. This ensures that every participant selected is not only deserving of support but is also driven to achieve her goals and is capable of excelling with the right opportunities.

Selection Criterion

- Low socioeconomic status – Family Income <216,000/- p.a.
- Girls with an aptitude for studying – Min 60% marks in X Standard
- Girls enrolled in Government or Government-aided schools
- Citizens of India

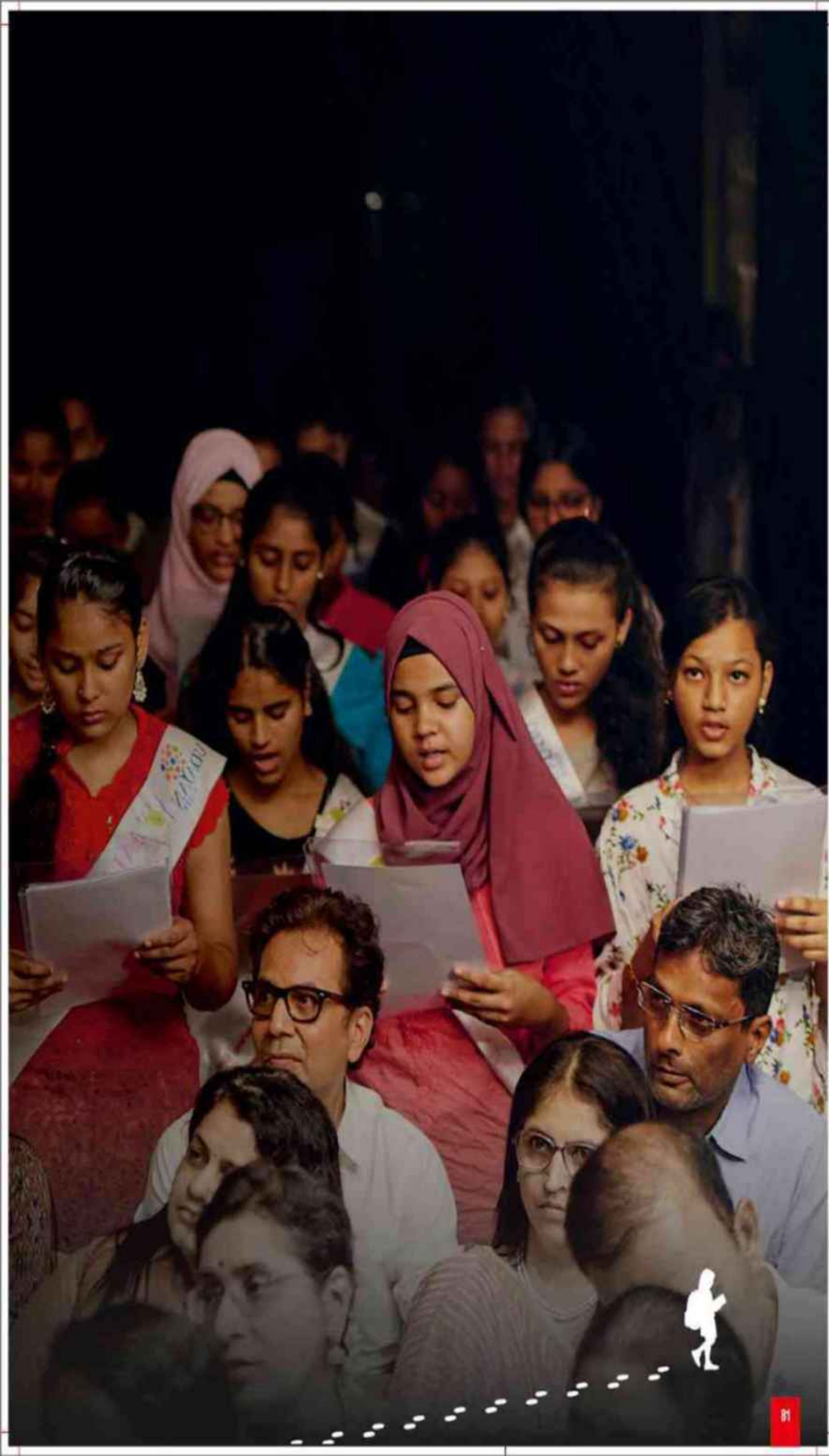

Skilling & Livelihood Program

India stands at a pivotal moment. Each year, millions of young people enter the workforce, yet many struggle to find meaningful employment. The gap between what employers expect and what young people can offer remains wide, especially for those from underserved communities. A lack of higher education, limited access to quality training, and employability skills such as communication and problem-solving, as well as secure livelihood opportunities, prevent them from realising their potential.

Udayan Care's Skilling & Livelihood Program was designed to bridge this divide. By establishing centres in urban and semi-urban neighbourhoods, we make learning accessible to marginalised youth. These centres offer certificate courses in IT/ITES, BFSI, Digital Tech, and vocational skills in Telecom and Green Tech aligned with industry demand, while also focusing on holistic development. Training goes beyond technical knowledge to include confidence-building, financial literacy, resilience, and job readiness—equipping participants not only for their first job but also for long-term growth. Continuous support ensures they can upgrade their skills as market needs evolve.

This journey reflects the theme of Footsteps for My Future Path. Every course completed, every new skill mastered, and every challenge overcome becomes a footprint marking progress. These steps may seem small, but collectively they shape the path toward a sustainable livelihood, dignity and lasting financial independence.

For Udayan Care, skill development is not just about contributing to economic growth in line with national campaigns like Skill India and Viksit Bharat. It is equally about dignity, inclusion, and ensuring that every young person has the chance to take confident steps forward—building a future, one footprint at a time.

About the Program

Udayan Care's Skilling & Livelihood Program was launched in 2004 to empower underserved youth, enhance their livelihood opportunities, and contribute to their family income. Initially focused on digital literacy, the program gradually expanded over the course of a decade to encompass job-specific skills, addressing the evolving demands of the industry.

Udayan Care is empaneled with the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), Tally Education Private Limited, and Microsoft, offering training to youth aged 18–25 years in sectors such as IT-ITeS, BFSI, Telecom, Retail, and digital skills courses including Graphic Designing, Data Entry Operator, Accounts Assistant (Tally Prime), Retail Sales Associate, Broadband Technician, Mobile Repairing, Customer Care Executive, and the Community Technology Skills Program (CTSP).

Alongside technical training, the program emphasizes holistic development, providing regular sessions in soft skills, personality development, and basic financial literacy, complemented by workshops, activities, industry expert sessions, and exposure visits. This approach equips youth not only for their first job but also for long-term career growth.

Since 2015, a dedicated Placement Cell has been supporting students in securing relevant employment. The placement team has partnered with 350 employers, facilitating job opportunities for over 7,500 trained candidates. In 2024–25, the placement team achieved a remarkable milestone by securing the top performer position in the North region from Tally Education Private Limited, having achieved the highest placement numbers.

As part of the strategic roadmap for 2024–25, the program expanded by establishing four new skilling centres and completing due diligence for five additional centres, aiming to achieve 20 NSDC-accredited centres. Currently, the program operates in 6 states across India (Delhi, UP, Haryana, Gujarat, Telangana, and Maharashtra), running 25 Skilling & Livelihood Training Centres, which have impacted 30,737 youth since inception. This year, the program also ventured into the Telecom sector, offering certification in mobile repairs and broadband technician courses. To ensure the quality and relevance of training, the program continuously mobilizes resources to build the overall perspective of students. Initiatives this year included:

- Collaboration with Kritaggya Consulting (Jaspreet Chopra) to raise awareness on gender sensitization.
- Life skills sessions by Modicare Foundation, held at NOIDA, Ghaziabad, East Delhi, West Delhi, and Greater NOIDA centres.
- Advanced English-speaking training for 140 youth through Inlingua, an international school of languages.



Corporate volunteers from partners such as Ciena, HCL Foundation, Microsoft, Mercer Consulting India, Genpact, and Thomson Reuters conducted specialized sessions for the youth. The program also continued its series of central events, competitions, and placement drives, including graduation ceremonies, the annual alumni meet, and competitions in typing, accounting, and graphic design—ensuring active engagement from recipients and project partners alike.

Need for the Program

According to the Global Business Coalition for Education (GBC-Education), UNICEF, and the Education Commission, over 50% of Indian youth are not on track to gain the education and skills necessary for employment by 2030. Additionally, data from the World Bank and the CMIE Pyramid Household Survey 2021-22 indicate that 13 million youth enter the job market in India annually, contributing to an oversupply of labor and suppressed wages, while only 2% of the workforce is formally skilled.

Through the Udayan Care Skilling & Livelihood Program, we aim to reach youth from lower socio-economic strata in urban slums and rural communities. Our skilling centres offer short-term, market-aligned training courses and ensure holistic development through soft skills and personality training, preparing participants to access meaningful career opportunities.



Salient Features of the Program

- Fully equipped centres with modern infrastructure and facilities.
- Short-term, industry-aligned skilling courses for youth not enrolled in formal education, helping them achieve self-sufficiency and financial independence.
- Soft skills and personality development through structured, regular training sessions to boost confidence and broaden career horizons.
- Minimal cost or 'freeship' options, removing financial barriers for marginalized communities.
- Gender-inclusive approach, ensuring equal participation of female recipients in skill training courses. Two centres in Telangana are for 100% female students.
- Certified courses through reputed agencies like NSDC and TEPL, enhancing employability and credibility.
- Industry exposure and expert sessions are delivered with the support of corporate volunteers, offering real-world insights.
- Dedicated placement cell that tracks job opportunities, prepares students, and connects them with relevant employers.
- Post-placement tracking, monitoring career progress, and supporting long-term retention in employment.
- A vibrant and engaged Alumni Network, who remain connected to the program and contribute in multiple ways - donations, counseling and advising students, as well as referring job opportunities within their organizations.

The Udayan Care Skilling & Livelihood Program offers courses aligned with leading industry standards and recognized certifications, including the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), Tally Education Pvt. Ltd. (TEPL), and Microsoft. These accreditations enhance the credibility of the training and improve the employability of our youth.

Program Expansion (New Centre Inauguration)



In the year 2024-25, the Udayan Care Skilling & Livelihood Training Program expanded its reach by establishing four new skilling centres, commencing with the inauguration of the Manesar Skill Development Training Centre in April 2024. This was the first training centre established with the support of Ciena, where we introduced telecom sector courses such as Broadband Technician,

Mobile Repairing, and Customer Care Executive – Repair Centre and Relationship.

This year, we focused on setting up centres in Telangana. In July 2024, we inaugurated a centre in Uppal, Hyderabad, with the support of Swatch Group. Additionally, with the continued support of our long-term partner Microsoft, we inaugurated two digital literacy training centres: one in Vikarabad, where the official inauguration ceremony was attended by M. Sudhir (Additional Collector, LB) and his team, Zakir Ahmad (Municipal Commissioner), and Rajalaxmi from Microsoft; and another centre in Tandur, inaugurated by IAS Uma Shankar Prasad (Sub-Collector, Vikarabad) and IAS Uma Harathi (IAS Trainee – Vikarabad). Both centres are specifically designed to provide quality training to underprivileged girls.

Workshops & Activities

The Udayan Care Skilling & Livelihood Program focuses on the holistic development of youth through regular classes in soft skills and personality development. Alongside, students participate in specialized training sessions, workshops, and co-curricular activities that build confidence and expand their career horizons. Many of these sessions are made possible with the support of internal teams and external industry experts.

Biztech Bootcamp at 1E

The ceremony was attended by David Todd (Director IT & DEX, 1E), Laura Smith (Chief People Officer, 1E), and Ritu Nagar (Sr. Manager – CSR, 1E), who engaged with the students to learn about their career aspirations.

The event concluded with students presenting a handmade thank-you card, which deeply touched the 1E team and reflected the gratitude and enthusiasm of the youth.

Pol Volunteering Sessions by HCLTech



Udayan Care partnered with HCL Foundation to establish a Skilling & Livelihood Centre (Yuvakendra) in NOIDA. The HCL Foundation team has actively mobilized several passionate employees as volunteers to conduct sessions focused on the holistic development of youth.

Col. Davinder Kassal (Head of Security Operations, HCLTech) and Abhishek went beyond

participating in events such as graduation ceremony, patriotic day celebrations, and alumni meet, demonstrating a sustained interest in the students' progress. They engaged directly with students to understand how learnings were applied in daily life.

Additionally, six HCLTech employees conducted specialized training sessions on ChatGPT and AI, while Nikhil Chauhan led a session on navigating job portals and building a strong LinkedIn profile.

In total, HCLTech volunteers contributed 38 dedicated hours, sharing valuable knowledge and expertise that significantly supported students' career development and readiness for the professional world.

Udayan Care Recipients' Visit to Ciena's Office



On January 7, 2025, recipients from Udayan Care's Dundahera, New Kondli, and Manesar skilling centres had the unique opportunity to visit Ciena's office in Gurugram (Haryana) during the visit of the Ciena Global Leadership Team. The visit, hosted by Vineet Sharma (Head, Legal & CSR – Ciena), aimed to highlight the impact of Ciena's CSR support extended from 2022–23. Over the past three

Recipients enrolled in Python, Broadband Technician, and Mobile Repair courses showcased their newly acquired skills through practical demonstrations, reflecting the quality of training at the centres. The day also included career guidance sessions, where Ciena volunteers engaged students in structured group discussions, sharing valuable career insights, personal experiences, and professional growth tips.

The visit concluded on a heartfelt note when a group of students presented a handmade thank-you card to Sheela Kosaraju (Sr. VP, General Counsel, Chief People Officer, Ciena). This thoughtful gesture of gratitude deeply touched her.

This visit was an inspiring milestone for the recipients, reinforcing the role of skill development and corporate mentorship in shaping brighter and more sustainable futures.



Session on Generative AI by Genpact



Udayan Care partnered with Genpact to introduce youth to the possibilities of generative AI tools, equipping them with future-ready skills. Rahman (Vice President – IT, Genpact), along with a team of eight volunteers, led a series of structured half-day training sessions across Udayan Care's skilling centres in Delhi NCR.

The initiative reached 240 recipients, offering them hands-on exposure to emerging AI

technologies. From this group, 30 recipients were selected to participate in a three-month advanced weekend training program, specifically designed to enhance their coding and AI expertise.

This collaboration not only expanded recipients' technical knowledge but also marked a significant step in preparing them for the rapidly changing world of work.

Celebrating World Youth Skill Day



Since 2004, Udayan Care has been committed to empowering young people through its Skilling & Livelihood Training Centres, now spread across six states of India. On 15th July 2024, our teams and recipients came together to celebrate World Youth Skills Day, observed with the global theme "Youth Skills for Peace & Development."

Across our 25 IT & Skill Development Centres, more than 900 recipients actively participated in activities designed to showcase and strengthen their skills.

- Delhi (Vinod Nagar & NOIDA Sector 57): 30 students joined an event hosted by Vishwa Yuvak Kendra, Chanakyapuri, participating in learning and exchange sessions.
- NOIDA Sector 80: Three internal competitions were held—Typing, 1-Minute Elevator Pitch, and Packaging Design—tailored to the courses Data Entry Operator, Customer Care Executive, and Graphic Designing.
- Faridabad: Six alumni were invited to share their expertise on AI tools, providing current students with valuable exposure to emerging technologies.
- Other Centres: Recipients expressed their perspectives on skill development through posters and PowerPoint presentations, combining creativity with reflection.
- Industry exposure and expert sessions are delivered with the support of corporate volunteers, offering real-world insights.

Graduation Ceremony – Telecom



On February 23, 2025, the Skilling & Livelihood Program team hosted a graduation ceremony to celebrate 147 recipients who completed their training at Udayan Care's Dundahera, Manesar (Gurugram), and New Kondli (East Delhi) skilling centres. Supported by Ciena, the graduates were trained in IT-ITES, BFSI, and Telecom.



The event began with a presentation highlighting the centres' impact, followed by a role-play performance on the importance of skill training. Alumni from the Broadband Tech and Mobile Repair Training program shared their journeys, inspiring current students.

A key highlight was the certificate distribution, where parents were invited to present certificates to their children, making the milestone more personal and memorable. Sakshi, Company Secretary at Ciena, joined the celebration, interacted with recipients, and commended the centre teams for their commitment to providing impactful training.

Celebrating International Women's Day



Udayan Care's Skilling & Livelihood Program celebrated International Women's Day across all IT centres with a series of activities aligned with this year's theme, "Accelerate Action."

The celebrations began with graduation ceremonies at Vikarabad (Telangana) and Yuvakendra (NOIDA), complemented by inspiring role-plays that highlighted the transformative power of skilling. At the

Manesar (Gurugram) Centre, students participated in a special self-defence session led by Sabya (Taekwondo Silver Medalist) and Rishita (Judo Gold Medalist), joined by Constables Monika and Poonam from the Manesar Police Station. The session empowered youth with essential self-defence techniques and confidence.

Creativity took centre stage at NOIDA Sector 57 and West Vinod Nagar, where students expressed their perspectives through poster and essay writing competitions. Meanwhile, the Head Office team hosted the 6th Typing Speed Competition, with 55 recipients from 19 IT centres across India. Of these, 46 participated in person, while 9 joined virtually from Vadodara, Mumbai, and Telangana. The four-round contest concluded with medals and gift hampers for the top three winners, presented by Shruti Jha (Alumna – Yuvakendra, NOIDA, 2021-22 batch).

This celebration was not just an event—it was a strong reminder that skills, education, and empowerment are key drivers of lasting change.



Campus Placement Drive



The Placement Cell at Udayan Care worked diligently to ensure maximum student placements in relevant job roles. In August 2024 and February 2025, large batches of youth completed their job-specific training courses at Udayan Care's skilling centres.

To facilitate prompt employment, the team organized two major campus placement drives:

- August Drive: 13 recruiters from 7 placement agencies interviewed 220 candidates on the same day, resulting in 164 recipients being shortlisted for potential placement.
- February 2025 Drive: With the support of six employment companies, 192 candidates were interviewed, and 118 students received job offers for positions such as Data Operator, Customer Support, Backend Support Executive, and MIS Executive, with salary bands ranging from ₹12,000 to ₹18,000 per month.

These placement drives played a crucial role in bridging the gap between training and employment, helping students transition smoothly into the workforce.

Accounting Skill Competition



On 30th November 2024, the Udayan Care Skilling & Livelihood Program organized an Accounting Skill Competition to nurture the potential of youth in the field of accounting. The event specifically targeted recipients enrolled in the Accounts Assistant (Tally Prime) course across Udayan Care training centres. The competition aimed to foster a healthy competitive spirit, encouraging students to excel not only in software training but also in

theoretical accounting knowledge. 45 recipients from 18 skilling centres, including participants from Vadodara and Mumbai, took part in the event.

Shining Stars



Turning passion into a sustainable livelihood

Anuj was born in a village in Etawah (Uttar Pradesh). A few years ago, his father moved to Narsinghpur village (Gurugram) with the family and started working as a driver to provide his children with a good education. Anuj completed his schooling with grace marks and decided to pursue higher education through distance learning, while simultaneously working at a shop. However, he was not satisfied with the earnings. Through one of his friends, he learned about Udayan Care's Mobile Repair training course. After seeking permission from his father, he enrolled in the 4-month program. Daily commuting from Narsinghpur to Manesar was challenging, but Anuj managed it because the course matched his interests.

After successfully completing the training and with the support of his father and elder brother, Anuj set up his own mobile repair shop in Narsinghpur village. Within a few months, he received an excellent response from the community and started earning ₹20,000–₹25,000 per month, marking a new chapter of independence and success in his life.



Tripti's journey from determination to design excellence

Tripti first learned about Udayan Care through a neighbour who had completed a skilling course at the Vinod Nagar centre. Motivated to pursue a career in the creative field, she enrolled in the four-month Desktop Publishing (Graphic Design) program at the NOIDA Sector 57 skilling centre. The daily commute from North East Delhi to NOIDA was challenging, but Tripti's dedication and determination kept her going.

After completing her training, Tripti secured her first role as a Graphic Intern at Keyword India, earning a starting salary of ₹12,000 per month. Committed to continuous learning, she enhanced her skills in graphic design tools and strengthened her academic foundation. Her persistence paid off, and she rose to the position of Senior Graphic Designer at Coffee & Creative, an advertising agency in Pitampura, earning a monthly salary of ₹50,000.

Tripti has become a proud achiever and alumna of Udayan Care, never missing an opportunity to mentor current students, sharing her expertise and professional network to support their career growth.

Skill Development Centre

About the Program

Launched in 2004, Udayan Care's Skill Development Centre (SDC) Program addresses unemployment and illiteracy, with a special focus on women from underserved communities. The program equips young people and women with practical vocational skills to achieve financial independence and boost their self-confidence.

Operating in Greater NOIDA (Uttar Pradesh) and Pauri Garhwal (Uttarakhand), the SDCs offer training in Stitching, Beauty Therapy, Jewelry Making, Graphic Design, and Computer Skills (including Hindi/English typing). The centers are inclusive, welcoming women, youth, school dropouts, and homemakers seeking livelihood opportunities.

Each center also has a play school to support mothers and guardians. Post-training, learners either find employment or start their own ventures. The program also runs Sukriti, a sustainable brand showcasing eco-friendly, hand-crafted products by trainees.

Need for the Program

In many parts of India, systemic gender bias, entrenched poverty, and inadequate infrastructure continue to act as major barriers to women's education and workforce participation. A significant proportion of girls are compelled to leave school prematurely due to domestic responsibilities, early marriage, or societal pressures, while others are denied the chance to enroll altogether. For older women—particularly those married young—the prospect of continuing education or entering the economy remains distant, reinforcing cycles of dependency and exclusion.

The Skill Development Centre (SDC) Program bridges this gap by offering training without age or academic barriers. It is designed for first-generation learners, homemakers, and youth who need practical skills and a second chance. With minimal fees and a strong focus on hands-on learning, the program helps participants build livelihoods, support their families, and reclaim their sense of dignity and identity.

Advanced Makeup Workshop

On 8 January 2025, Udayan Care hosted an Advanced Makeup Workshop for grooming trainees, guided by industry expert Mrs. Smita Dixit. Designed to strengthen professional competency, the session introduced students to bridal styling, product and brush selection, eye artistry, and colour theory.

Working on live models, trainees practiced advanced techniques—learning the precision and discipline that define the beauty industry. For many, it marked their first step into professional makeup work.

The workshop deepened skills, built confidence, and affirmed our commitment to opening pathways for youth to pursue dignified careers in the grooming and beauty sector.



International Yoga Day Celebration

At SDC Pauri, International Yoga Day unfolded in quiet discipline and shared purpose. Under the guidance of Centre Manager Ms. Nirmala Bisht, students and staff explored asanas, pranayama, and simple meditation—an introduction to the grounding language of yoga.

For many, it was their first structured encounter with this ancient practice. They left lighter, clearer, and more aware of the calm they could carry into daily life.

The day affirmed a simple truth we hold close: skill and well-being are intertwined. When young people learn to care for their bodies and minds, they step into their future with steadier hands and a stronger sense of self.



Showcasing Skill & Sustainability: Stitching Trainees' Garment Exhibition

At SDC Pauri, learning stepped confidently into the real world through a Self-Made Clothes Exhibition. Twelve stitching trainees transformed old sarees into beautifully

tailored suits—proof of how skill and imagination can give new life to what we already have.

Local women gathered to admire the work, offering thoughtful encouragement and reminding trainees that their craft holds real earning potential. The event championed sustainability, creativity, and the quiet pride of making something with one's own hands.

Rooted in the SDC vision, the exhibition strengthened what we believe deeply: when young women gain market-ready skills and self-belief, they begin to shape their own paths toward independence.

Industry Collaboration with USHA: Bridging Traditional Skills with Modern Technology



On 16 May 2024, the Skill Development Centre in Greater Noida welcomed USHA for a two-day, hands-on training. Led by Mr. Saurav, over 25 trainees explored digital embroidery, machine operations, and advanced stitching techniques, including button fixing, hemming, eyelets, and logo design.

The workshop connected familiar craft with modern technology, showing how computer-aided tools can expand production and open new livelihood pathways. The room buzzed with curiosity as students experimented, asked questions, and discovered fresh possibilities.

The collaboration strengthened skills and raised aspirations—reminding learners that with the right exposure, their craft can evolve into opportunity.

Collaboration with Khadi & Co., Bess Nielsen for Sukriti Beaded Jewellery



Our Skill Development Program partnered with Khadi & Co., led by French designer Bess Nielsen, to elevate Sukriti's beaded jewellery line. During a hands-on workshop, our women trainees worked closely with the Khadi & Co. team, exploring global design trends, colour harmony, and fine finishing.

The exchange not only refined technical skills but also opened a window to international standards. It sparked confidence, creativity, and pride—showing artisans that their craft can travel far beyond local markets. This collaboration strengthened Sukriti's design voice and moved it closer to global pathways for handcrafted work.

Events & Competitions

Marathi Look Competition: Blending Culture with Skill



As part of the Grooming course at our Skill Development Centre in Greater Noida, trainees participated in an internal competition celebrating the traditional Marathi look. The activity gave them hands-on experience in theme-based styling, exploring traditional makeup, saree draping, and cultural symbolism.

The competition fostered creativity, precision, and cultural appreciation while strengthening technical skills. Winners were recognized for capturing the elegance and authenticity of the Marathi aesthetic. Beyond skill-building, the event boosted confidence and showcased the relevance of their training.

This initiative reflects our commitment to holistic development—blending technical expertise with creativity, cultural literacy, and self-expression.

Typing Speed Competition



To boost digital literacy and workplace readiness, SDC Pauri Centre organized a Typing Speed Competition for students in the Typing and Data Entry Operator courses. The timed challenge encouraged accuracy, speed, and practical application of their skills. Manas Thapliyal emerged as the top performer, typing 68 words per minute with 93% accuracy—a reflection of dedication and growing digital proficiency among rural youth.

Beyond scores, the competition fostered confidence, self-discipline, and readiness for data-driven careers, exemplifying the centre's commitment to hands-on, learner-focused skill development.

Empowered to Shine: Skill Meets Culture on the Ramp

At Greater Noida, students brought their creativity to life in a vibrant ramp walk themed “Beautiful Indian Women.” Fourteen distinct cultural looks—from Bengali bridal and Gujarati Dandiya to Punjabi Lohri, Bhojpuri Teej, and contemporary office and party styles—were showcased after a month of meticulous preparation.



The event celebrated India's diversity and the students' dedication, while offering a platform to build confidence, express artistry, and own their skills. Beyond a showcase, the ramp walk reflected the deeper goal of the program: empowering young women to step into public spaces with self-belief, challenge norms, and translate training into visible, transformative growth.

Sukriti by Udayan Care

A Label to Stand Out

Advocacy, Research, and Training

Udayan Care's Advocacy, Research, and Training practice focuses on improving the rights and well-being of children without parental care in India and South Asia. Our advocacy is people-centric, empowering civil society to enhance care standards for orphans and vulnerable children. Over 31 years, we have developed evidence-based practices, influencing policy through seminars, consultations, and networking on Alternative Care.

"We generate evidence by conducting research, publishing findings, documenting on-ground practices, and providing training to stakeholders to ensure continuous improvement in care models."

We organize capacity-building workshops for staff and professionals, and host the Biennial Conferences on Alternative Care (BICONS), uniting Asian stakeholders to address child rights and mental health. Additionally, we publish the bi-annual journal 'Institutionalised Children Explorations and Beyond' (ICB), in partnership with SAGE Publications, to advance regional evidence and discourse on alternative care.

Advocacy through Conferences & Presentations

In FY 2024-25, we have delivered 30 presentations (9 on international platforms and 21 at the national level) further amplifying evidence-based practices and influencing discourse on child protection and alternative care both in India and globally.



In FY 2024-25, Udayan Care engaged on 8 international platforms, advocating for family-based care, aftercare, youth empowerment, mental health, and alternative care reforms. Highlights included presenting our FIT Families Together model at the Alliance Annual Meeting and amplifying youth voices at FICE and INTRAC forums.



In FY 2024-25, Udayan Care engaged in 22 national platforms to strengthen care reform and inclusion. From CAFT-India consultations on disability inclusion to state- and district-level aftercare roundtables in Gujarat, Telangana, and Delhi, we brought youth, government, and civil society together. We also shared trauma-informed practices and mentoring models at national dialogues, while UFT Fellows amplified youth voices on gender inclusion.

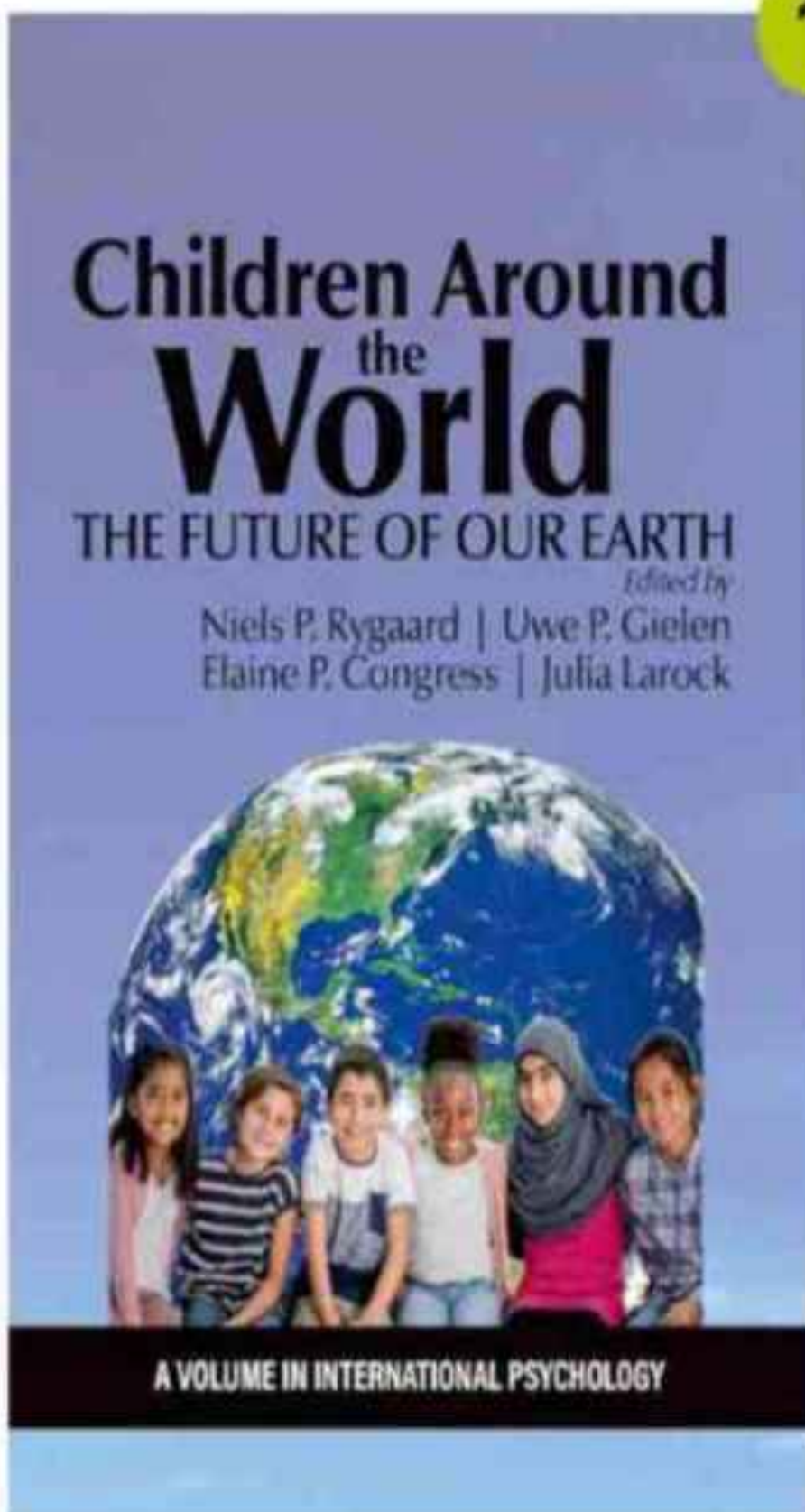


In November, we convened a symposium on Advancing Evidence-Based Practices in Family Strengthening and Alternative Care for Stronger Communities in partnership with Amity University, Noida Campus, bringing together over 60 delegates and focused on the critical role of research, data, and evidence generation in strengthening families across India. During the symposium, we also released the September special issue of the ICB Journal on kinship care, highlighting emerging research, field experiences, and policy perspectives.

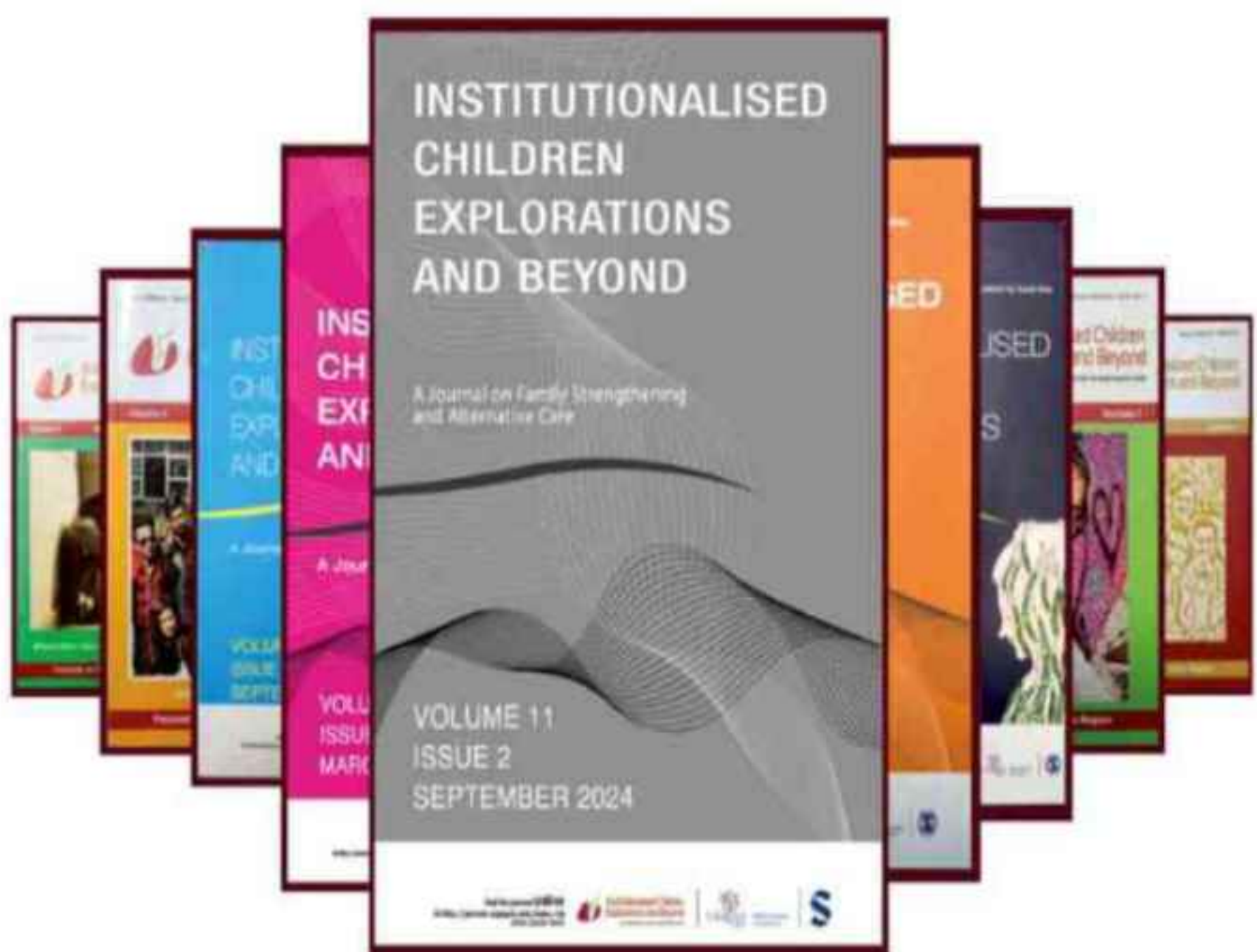

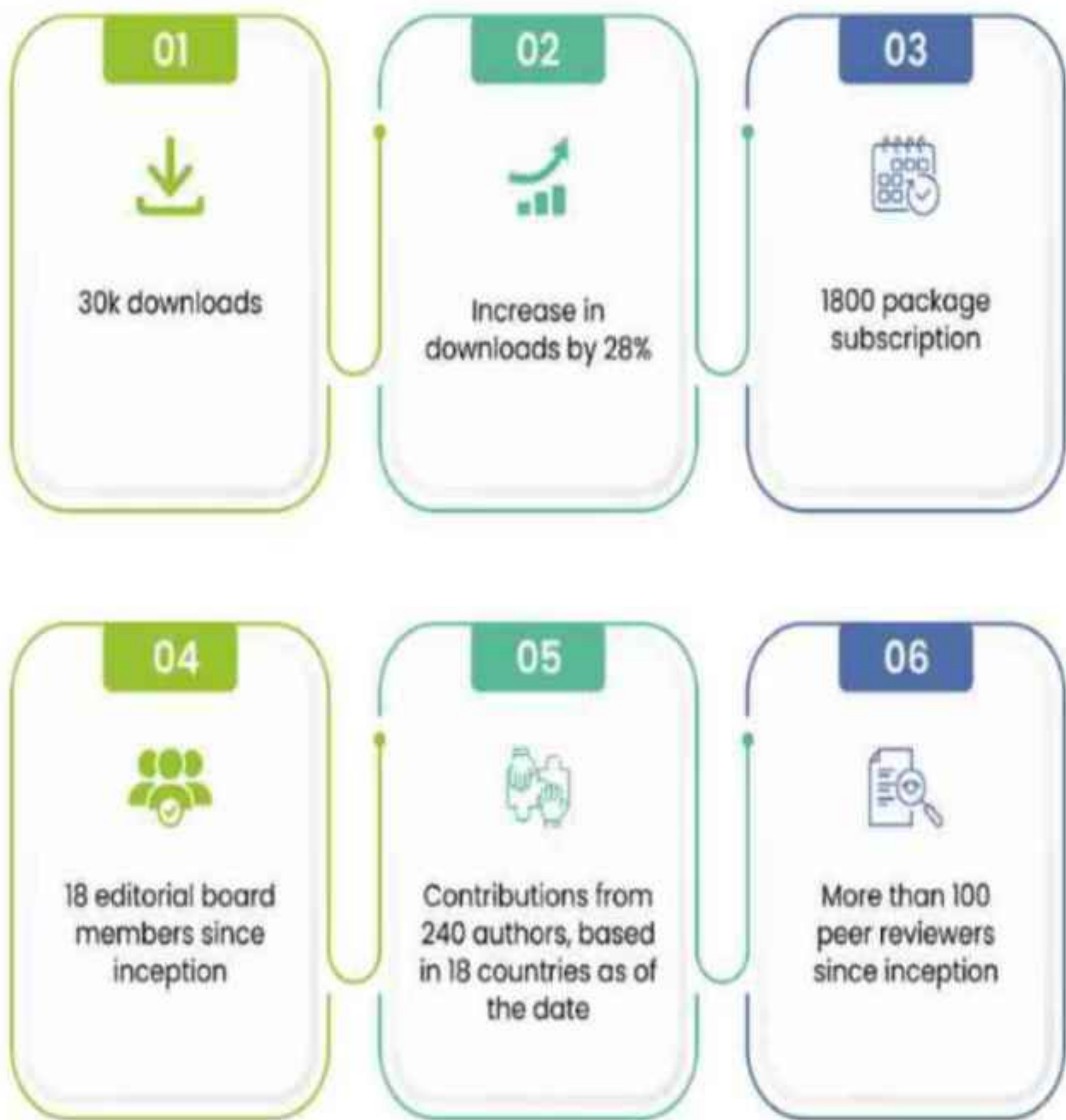


Institutionalised Children Explorations and Beyond (ICB) Journal

Recognizing the critical need for data-driven advocacy, we launched the Institutionalised Children Explorations and Beyond (ICB) Journal in March 2014. ICB is an international, peer-reviewed academic journal focusing on Family Strengthening and Alternative Care. Published by Sage Publications and listed in the UGC CARE list. With 23 issues published to date, the journal brings together original research, good practices, and expert interview pieces aimed at influencing policy, standards, and counseling practices for children and youth without parental care.

In FY 2024-25, we released two issues of the ICB Journal, our bi-annual publication, with the September edition as a special issue on Kinship Care and the March edition reflecting developments in child protection and care systems.

Key Highlights



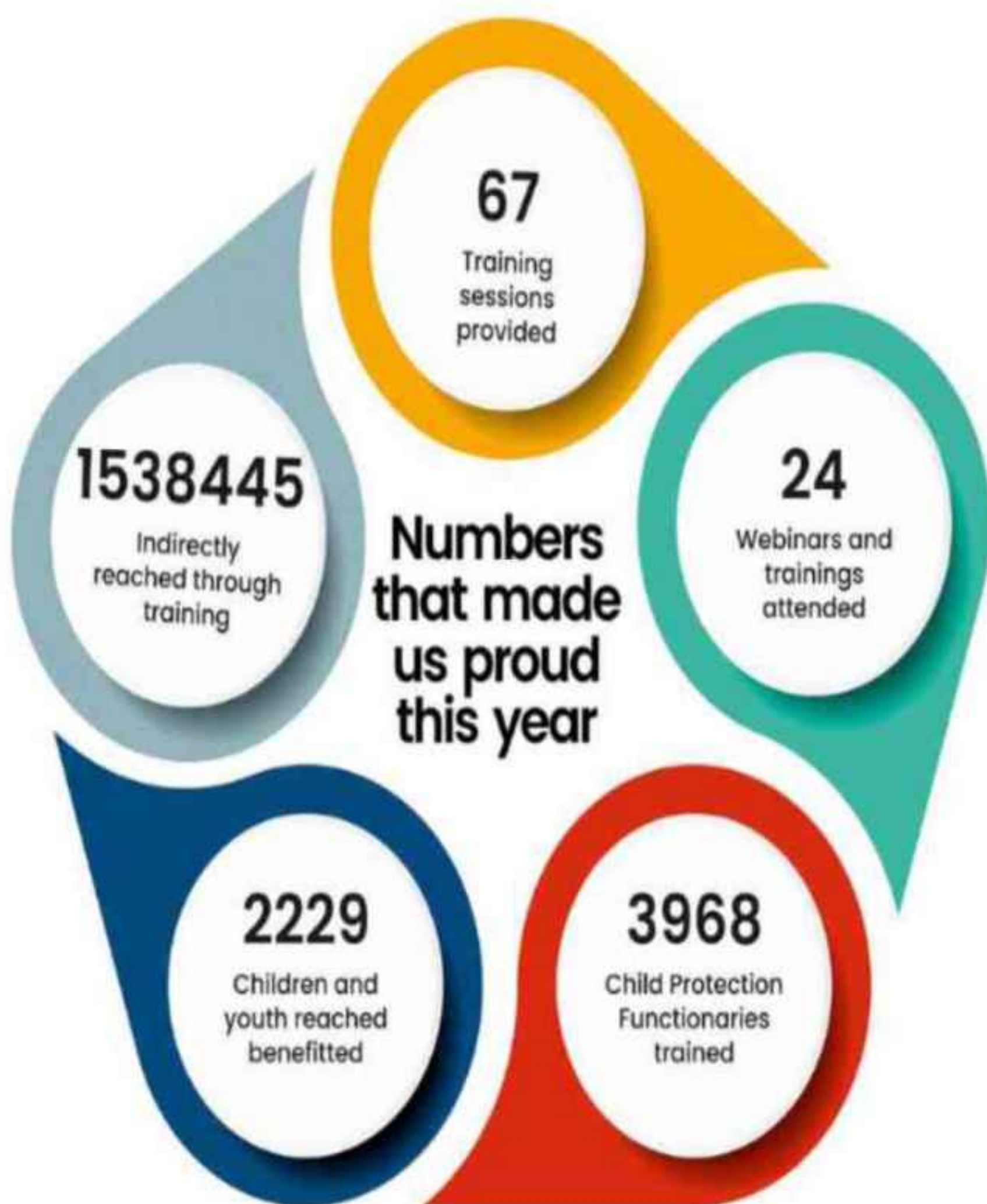
Capacity Building/Trainings



We deliver structured training to three key audiences: children in care (15–18 years), care leavers (18+), and Child Protection Functionaries. For children in care and care leavers, we offer digitized courses on Passport to Earning (P2E), available on the UNICEF YuWaah platform under the 21st Century Skills section. These include two digital life skills programs– Skills for Independent Living (15–18 years) and Work-Life Readiness (18+), each covering four thematic areas such as self-awareness, financial literacy, communication, and emotional well-being. These modules aim to build confidence, independence, and essential life skills among vulnerable youth. So far, 230 care leavers and children in care have completed the digital P2E course, and 809 care-experienced and community youth have been reached through 48 in-person life skills sessions.

For Child Protection Functionaries, we offer a 13-module curriculum and have conducted 52 external training sessions across India on key areas such as aftercare and Individual Care Plans (ICPs).

Internally, our Learning and Development team has facilitated 9 staff training sessions on themes such as mental health, gender inclusion, and theory of change, while departments continue to strengthen team capacities through regular internal training.



The Way Forward

Looking ahead, we are confident that resilience and hope will guide us as we work deeper and more strategically. We will focus on strengthening partnerships with government agencies, academic institutions, and civil society to advance systemic change. Our efforts will prioritize policy engagement, participatory research on emerging issues such as disability and gender in care, and capacity-building for children, youth, and child protection professionals. We will continue to foster inclusive learning environments, develop contextual training resources, and expand the ART Knowledge Hub as a shared platform for innovation and collective learning.

Udayan Care USA (UCUSA) was incorporated in 2009 to improve the lives of disadvantaged women and children in India, while also raising awareness of their challenges in the United States. It was established by Udayan Care's international volunteers and donors—Jesse George-Nichols, Rakesh Surie, and Seth Call—together with Dr. Kiran Modi, founder and managing trustee of Udayan Care India.

In FY 2024–25, UCUSA raised \$400,165, with total expenses of \$4,318. During the same year, UCUSA provided grants worth \$451,446 to Udayan Care India in support of three key programs: Udayan Ghars, Udayan Shalini Fellowship (USF), and IT & Vocational Training (ITVT) Centers. This year marked a record achievement, with the highest-ever funds raised since UCUSA's inception.



Donors

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all our donors—individuals, families, trusts, and corporations—for their unwavering support.

Our corporate donors continued their annual pledges and matching donations, including American Express, Hewlett Packard, Nvidia, Google, Intel, Bright Funds Network, and Fidelity Charitable. Additionally, fundraising platforms such as Benevity Causes, GiveIndia, Charities Aid Foundation (CAF) of America, American Online Giving, and Global Giving helped UCUSA raise over \$100,000 this fiscal year.

Udayan Care Germany Overview (April 2024 – March 2025)

Udayan Care Germany was founded in 2014 in Berlin by a group of ten friends. Since 2021, the executive board has remained unchanged, with Thomas von Hake, Dr. Nina Aldag, Niels Hiddemann, and Dr. Kiran Modi in place. Juergen Osterhage, who worked for several years in India as a journalist for a German TV channel, continues to serve as the “informal chairman.”

Since 2015, the annual budget has been dedicated to the Shalini Fellowship Program, supporting young women in India in building a brighter future.

Events

The annual members’ meeting was held in person on 7 December 2024, with seven members participating. Himanshu, who previously worked at a Udayan ITVT Centre in Delhi, also joined and offered his support to Udayan Care Germany. The meeting began with a review of the past year, followed by the financial report, and concluded with discussions on future plans.

It was also decided that the next Charity Dinner will be held in November 2025. The venue is yet to be finalized, with Berlin and Hamburg both being considered, as many friends and supporters in Hamburg have expressed interest.

Additionally, the need to renew the website was agreed upon, and Himanshu volunteered to take on this task.

Donors

In 2024, Udayan Care Germany contributed approximately €50,000 in total to Udayan Care India. Approximately €7,000 was raised through membership fees, and an additional €50,000 was raised through donations. A special thanks goes to Zoé Lu, the Munich-based handbag label, and to Gerlinde for their continued generosity and remarkable support.

The contributions of members also form an important part of the annual donation pool. Each contribution, no matter the size, makes a meaningful difference—and we remain deeply grateful for every single one.

With the support of these donations, Udayan Care Germany is currently able to support 160 Shalinis in India.

Universal Themes

Udayan Care's diverse interventions - ranging from child protection and girls' education to the skilling of youth - are unified by a shared set of guiding principles that define our institutional ethos. These foundational pillars ensure that each initiative not only delivers measurable outcomes but also fosters a culture of empathy, accountability, and holistic growth within the communities we serve.

Mentoring

"A mentor is someone who sees more talent and ability within you than you see in yourself, and helps bring it out of you." - Bob Proctor.

At Udayan Care, mentoring is the art of forging unbreakable bonds. For a child in a Udayan Ghar, the emotional anchor is provided by a Mentor Parent. They are not fleeting figures; they are individuals who provide a continuous presence in the life of a child. They are the steady hand, the unwavering advocate, and the source of unconditional love that turns a house into a home. With 2-3 mentors dedicated to each home, we build a foundation of stability, creating bonds that children carry with them long after they've grown, into aftercare and throughout their lives.

Mentors play a vital role in the Udayan Shalini Fellowship Program for girls' education and empowerment by offering emotional support, guidance, and

inspiration. They help girls build confidence, navigate academic and personal challenges, and develop essential life skills, such as communication and decision-making. By serving as relatable role models, mentors expand girls' aspirations and show them what's possible beyond traditional roles. They foster a sense of self-worth and agency, encouraging girls to advocate for themselves and lead change in their communities. Over time, mentored girls often become mentors themselves, creating a ripple effect of empowerment and leadership.

And for a young adult from our Aftercare Outreach Program, navigating the complexities of independent living after growing up in institutional care, a mentor is a critical lifeline. They are the trusted voice in moments of doubt, the practical guide when the path is unclear, and the reminder that they do not walk alone.



Volunteering and Internships

"You give but little when you give of your possessions. It is when you give of yourself that you truly give." - Kahlil Gibrain.

There is a special kind of alchemy that happens when compassion meets action. It's the moment a shared purpose becomes a shared effort, and that effort becomes tangible change. This is the spirit our volunteers bring—not just helping from the outside, but rolling up their sleeves and becoming part of our very fabric.

The Mentor Parents in our Udayan Ghars, are committed volunteers-for-life, providing the foundation of family to a child who needs it the most. The Udayan Shalini Fellowship Program has expanded its reach across 16 states of India, thanks to volunteers who raised their hands to become Convenors and Core Committee members. They are passionate individuals who have opened their networks and resources to support the program's success. Their deep involvement, strategic guidance, and program supervision is invaluable.

Udayan Care is fortunate to have a highly involved Board and a Governing Council constituted of professionals and individuals of eminence, who have been volunteering with the organization for more than two decades. Udayan Care USA, Germany, and

Canada have all been set up and managed by volunteers and well-wishers of the organization.

Our internship program, in particular, is a vibrant exchange of ideas. Students from fields like management, law, social work, and psychology don't just observe; they dive in. They contribute meaningfully to our mission while discovering their own potential, finding that in giving, they receive just as much in return.

This year, we were humbled by the 253 new volunteers and 120 interns who joined us in our mission. Interns came from academic institutions in India, US, UK, and brought a global perspective and passion to our doorstep. They didn't just offer time; they offered themselves—their skills, their empathy, their unwavering belief in our cause.

To volunteer with Udayan Care is to become part of a global family. It is to look a young person in the eye and say, "I believe in you," with your actions, not just your words. It is to enrich your own life by helping to build a brighter future for others. This is the powerful, reciprocal gift of service.

Giving Back

At Udayan Care, we believe the most powerful proof of change is not just a life transformed—but a life that goes on to transform others. This is the beautiful circle we witness every day: the act of giving back, woven into the very fabric of who our recipients become.

In our Udayan Ghars, children learn that family is not just about receiving love, but about creating it. They are nurtured not only to stand on their own two feet but to reach out a hand to help someone else up. This isn't a lesson taught; it's a value lived.

For the young women of the Udayan Shalini Fellowship, social responsibility is a core part of their identity. From their first day, they understand that their own rise is intertwined with the upliftment of their communities. Through mentorship and action, they don't just aspire to succeed—they aspire to signify, using their own growth as a platform for good.

You can see this spirit in action everywhere. It's in our youth organizing cleanliness drives, offering free tuition to younger children, or sharing a moment of connection with residents at an old-age home. These aren't just items on a checklist; they are the seeds of empathy and citizenship, taking root. And the circle

completes itself most powerfully when our alumni return. Those who once leaned on a mentor now become one. Those who found solace in a supportive community now work to build it for others. Through our Aftercare programs and Care Leaver Networks, they step into the role of peer facilitators and guides, offering the same steadfast belief that was once offered to them.

This is the ripple effect we are so proud to foster. We are not just building self-reliant individuals; we are nurturing a generation of compassionate citizens. At Udayan Care, the greatest success story is a child who grows up to light the way for another.

Mental Health and Counseling

There is no greater journey than the one that leads you home to yourself - Matt Haig

At the heart of every dream is a child who believes they are worthy of dreaming it. At Udayan Care, we understand that before we can build futures, we must first help mend spirits. Our commitment to mental well-being is not a program—it is a promise: a promise to listen, to heal, and to remind every young person that their past does not define their potential.

In our Udayan Ghars, this begins with creating a sanctuary of safety. Our approach is built on the Trauma-Informed Care (TIC) model, a framework that recognizes the deep impact of past adversity. It's not about asking, "What is wrong with you?" but rather, "What has happened to you, and how can we help you heal?" Our dedicated mental health team—including counselors, trauma specialists, and a psychiatrist—works tirelessly to provide that consistent, compassionate care, helping children untangle their past and rediscover their own strength.

This same unwavering support extends to every corner of our work. The Udayan Shalini Fellows receive counselling to navigate the unique pressures of their academic and personal lives. Young adults in our Aftercare Outreach and LIFT programs find a trusted confidant in their counsellors, a safe space to build the emotional tools for independence. We extend this care to our frontline heroes—our childcare workers and mentors. By providing them with training in self-care and mental wellness, we ensure they have the resilience to hold space for others, creating a circle of well-being that benefits everyone.

By tending to the inner world of a child, we are not just healing wounds; we are laying the unshakable foundation for a healthier, more empowered, and hopeful future.

Prevention of Sexual Harassment (POSH)
